Mental hospital 'on track'

THE construction of the controversial mental hospital that started 13 years ago, will finally be completed at the end

The provincial government com-menced construction of The Kimber-ley Mental Health Hospital in 2004. Construction was halted several times leading to protracted court challenges between Vista Park/Joh Arch and the

government. Minister of Health Dr Aaron Mot-Minister of Health Dr Auron Mot-sealed thas said it is important for the hospital to be completed because men-tal patients in the province are being held in Correctional Services facilities. "There are a total of 26 State patients currently accommodated in Correc-tional Services facilities in the Northern Come," Motscololi said.

"The contractor has com-pleted 97% of all the wet-work trades with the final 3% set to be completed. "There is hope in this building com-pared to what it looked like a few years

ago. I am excited about the develop-ments in the hospital."

The MEC said he was confident com-pletion of the hospital would be this year and that his department would hand and that his department would hand over the facility to the health depart-ment. "We are committed to ensuring the project is completed, we also remain focused on dealing with challenges that may arise," he said.

The department said they were moni-toring the progress weekly to ensure its completion by the end of the year. Sokatsha said the provincial depart-ment of health, treasury and public works were working around the clock to ensure the state-of-the-art hospital was completed and serving the people of the province. "Over the past number of months a joint management committee team has been established to ensure there is adenuate senior oversight on team has been established to ensure there is adequate senior oversight on the project," he said.

An estimated R680m has been spent in the construction of the hospital, "We comprehend the need and high demand for specialised mental health care in the province," Sokatsha said. The hospital will include, among other things, a phorymore, a child and

other things, a pharmacy, a child and adolescence wards, overnight accom-modation, a library, a wellness centre

and other wards. The MEC said delays in the construction of the hospital were over and he was adamant that "in his lifetime" the hospital would be operational. "This is one of the most challenging projects we've ever started.

"Contractual disputes with the contractors have been the cause of the delay. Mota-Engil Construction said 300 people had been employed. The hospital was meant to be completed in 2008 at a cost of just under R900m. tiisetsom@thenewage.co.za
