Nowathe said the new station will boost the fight against crime in Winterveldt. Over the years, the Winterveldt community has called for a bigger police station, more police officers and additional resources, including vehicles, to assist in the fight against crime. Nowathe said the old station would not immediately be closed. "Client services remain at the old station while we get the new telephone lines connected and working. "Once that is done, all services will transfer to the new station," she said. Nowathe urged residents of Winterveldt to work hand in hand with the police to curb crime in the area. The construction of the new police station began in 2012. The new police station is bigger and gives police a boost in the fight against crime. Some locals were offered temporary employment during construction through the Expanded Public Works Programme. "We call on residents to use the local policing structures and services available at the station," said Nowathe. "A well functioning police station is important to people in any particular community. "It brings hope that whenever you have a challenge, you will have people who are there to listen to you and are willing to assist you. "Cracking down on crime, drug lords, corruption and criminals is a pressing matter. "We have and will continue to deal with our own members who use our dignified badge to do the opposite of what it stands for," said Nowathe.
