during the winter period and who meet the stipulated criteria, will receive food parcels, toiletries, mattresses and bedding as well as Expanded Public Works Programme workers to assist with cooking and cleaning. Mayco member for community services and health Zahid Badroodien said: "Shelters do feel the pinch

in winter when more street people seek respite from the elements. So this programme is designed to build capacity and to create the extra space and resources needed. I encourage organisations who want to apply to make sure that they meet all of the criteria and have all the relevant documentation to ensure that their application is successful." ensure their well-being over the colder months," said Badroodien. In its first nine months, the Safe Space hosted 450 people. Currently, there are 211 people on site.
