Mamelodi West Ward 28 residents held a meeting and decided to start a clean-up campaign to help keep the area spotless.

Last Wednesday, ward councillor Percy Zitha and the residents descended on Eerste Fabrieke Station.

They were joined by members of the Expanded Public Works Programme and the Tshwane Metro police.

Percy said more than five illegal dumpsites had been identified in his ward and would be tackled every week.

"We also addressed owners of the food stalls next to station to get refuse bags and pick up litter to help keep the area clean. We spoke to local recyclers to always keep their working areas tidy," said Percy.
