Killings must be curbed

Calls to protect officials and councillors as 'strategic' murders increase

While political killings have plagued KwaZulu-Natal, a new problem of municipal employees in strategic positions being in danger is starting to

This month, the communications manager at uMlalazi Local Municipality, Reginald Ngema, also killed. A bodyguard of a municipal man-

ager in that same municipality was also killed.

Nokuthula Dlamini, a communi-development worker (CDW) for Ward 16, in the Mtubatuba Local Municipality, was set alight in her

In a recent eThekwini executive meeting, Raymond Rampersad the head of Durban Solid Waste, said three employees were killed at landfill sites by a suspected "syndicate".

This is in addition to the killing of two ward councillors in KZN last

Canan Mdletshe, National Freedom Party (NFP) spokesperson said the province was "a ticking time bomb" with the killings and threats of intimidation.

Mdletshe said hung municipali-

ties in KZN have created instability and people are contesting positions through killings.

"The attack and killing of councillors is likely to increase if nothing ciniors is likely to increase in northing is urgently done. As we speak, our councillors in hung municipalities are fearing for their lives. If ministers who are not in any danger are protected, then councillors, who are at the coalface of service delivery, must be guarded. In fact, ministers should be stripped of their protection and councillors must be prioritised."

Last month, former MEC for Hu-

man Settlements and Public Works,

Iomo Sibiva lamented the conditions

that his staff were working under. Sibiya was speaking after the death of a worker in his department, Mfa-nafuthi Cele, who was shot and killed in KwaMashu, while on duty on matters relating to the relocation of flood victims.
"We remain concerned about the

emotional trauma that our staff are experiencing as a result of harassment and bullying by rogue elements in various parts of the province, espe-

cially in eThekwini," said Sibiya.

The KZN Department of Transport, Community Safety and Liaison

said it would hold a meeting soon that would be looking into the kill-ings of public representatives.

"The high-level meeting will look at urgent measures to resolve cases involving the killings of public representatives and discuss mechanisms to proactively end the ongoing heinous crimes in the province," the de-

partment said in a statement.
Nokubonga Dinga, South African Municipal Worker's Union (Samwu) KZN provincial secretary told *The* Witness that besides those in eThek-wini, municipal workers have not reported any fears to them.
