on to cast their votes openly in a roll call in a session of the National Assembly in the Cape Town City Hall on Monday. The ANC, DA and ACDP voted for the recommendation to remove Mkhwebane, providing enough votes to meet the two-thirds majority required to remove the head of a chapter nine institution.
