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Municipal workers protest in Mthatha over lack of protective clothing

More than 250 King Sabata Dalindyebo Municipality em-ployees staged a protest march in Mthatha on Wednesday, demanding to be issued with pro-tective clothing and proper

manding to be issued with protective clothing and proper
equipment.

The workers, affiliated to the
SA Municipal Workers Union
Gamwu, marched to the ANC
OR Tambo regional offices and
the municipal buildings.

They said they were also unhappy with the state of the
Munitata Building, which houses some municipal departments as well as mayor Nyaniso
Nelani and municipal manager
Ngamela Palkade's offices.

The marchers were forced to
turn back after finding the ANC
regional offices in Nelson Mandela Drive closed.

Samwu KSD chair Lwazi
Madyibi said they had decided
to march to the party's offices
because ANC deployees were
running the local municipality.

The marchers were told that

officials in the office had been deployed to Port St Johns municipality, where by-elections were taking place in ward 2.

"Let us not be discouraged," Madyibi told the marchers.

"We were not here to protest but to ask the party to intervene. We [municipal workers] are the face of service delivery.

"And yet we get insulted by the public. They say there is no service delivery. But they don't know the inside story."

The workers handed over a petition to Palade outside the Munitata building.

Speaking to journalists on the sidelines of the march, Madyibi said they believed the building was not safe.

"When it rains it leaks and there are no emergency exits in case of a fire. The only entry and exit point is the door."

He said workers in many municipal departments were forced to wear civilian clothes

nicipal departments were forced to wear civilian clothes on duty because the authorities had failed to provide them with



protective clothing

He said a municipal traffic officer Dan Mxoli, 62, who was shot and killed at a busy in-

motorist in October last year, did not have a bulletproof vest, pepper spray or firearm at the

glass while picking up thrash.
"He was wearing his own
takkies because they don't even

have safety boots," Madyibi said. He said even expanded public works programme workers were not being provided with protective clothing. Madyibi said the marchers

were also unhappy that senior managers were being given a monthly travel allowance of R15,000 each even though many worked in the office all

k13,000 each even though many worked in the office all day. Some staff members were also forced to use their own vehicles for work purposes, and the union wanted them to also get a ravel allowance instead of be-ing expected to claim from the municipality. In addition, the marchers wanted the municipality to stop

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wanted the municipality to stop outsourcing some services. Madyibi said KSD municipal bosses were hiring private ser-vice providers to man access points in municipal buildings, a job that had previously been done in house. Private contractors were also being used to fix electricity

Pakade assured the workers
that management and the
council valued the staff because
no municipality could function
without them.
He said KSD had already pro-

He said KSD had already pro-cured protective clothing for its staff. some of which had already arrived, while the rest was on the way.

He said the municipality would look into the other grievances raised by the Samwu members in their petition.

"Our community services have been keeping the town clean.

have been keeping the town clean.
"Complaints from the community [about the filthy state] of the town have gone down.
"Sometimes it might seem like we don't care but some things take longer to be done due to budget constraints," he said.

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
