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Buffalo City Metro creates employment opportunities on waste management

Buffalo City Metropolitan Munic-ipality together with its strategic partners, Buffalo City Mettopoli-tan Development Agency (BCM-DA) and Border Kei Chamber of Business (BKCCB) signed a Mem-orandum of Understanding from the National Tesany to imple-ment the Public Employment Programme (PEP).
