Minimum wage boost beats inflation

The national minimum wage will increase by R1,21c per hour from 1 March, bringing it from R27,58c to R28,79c per hour. Minister of employment & labour Nomakhosazana Meth gazetted the change on Tuesday. Cosatu hailed the "progressive" increase. which amounts to about

increase, which amounts to about 4,4%, sayng it comprises inflation plus 1.5%. "This will help protect the value of the national minimum wage and workers' ability to take care of their families," said parliamentary co-ordinator Matthew Parks. "It will inject badly needed stimulus into the
