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## Several school infrastructure projects are nearing completion, says MEC

While the construction of two public schools in Nelson Mandela Bay is in its final stages, Arcadia Secondary School is also gearing up for a facelift in the 2025/2026 finan-

cial year, with R125m bud-geted for the project. This was announced by Eastern Cape public works and human settlements MEC Siphokazi Lusithi during her budget and policy presentation at the Bhisho legislature on Tuesday for the 2025/2026 financial year. Construction of the R109m

David Livingstone Secondary School, which began in the 2024/2025 financial year, is

2024/2025 mancial year, is expected to be completed in May.

The Bethelsdorp Secondary School, with the project valued at R86m and 95% completed, is scheduled for completion in

The department has a R2.6bn budget for the financial

"[We are] spearheading the construction of school infras-tructure for the department of education in line with the ap-plicable norms and standards.

\*This is our contribution to the improvement of the condi-tion and quality of our schools, which will ultimately lead to

which will ultimately lead to better learner outcomes," Lusithi said.

The department had com-mitted to building six schools across the province in the pre-vious financial year, which were on average more than

90% complete, she said. The schools include Ash-

erville Secondary School, esti-mated to cost R90m, and Ling-com Primary School, valued at R87m. Both are in Graaff-

Both schools are 98% complete, with completion set for the end of June

Lusithi said the department would start construction at five new schools across the province for the 2025/2026 financial year. "The commencement of

these planned projects is expected to yield an average of 130 employment opportunities for members of the surrounding communities as well as nefit a minimum of 25 SMMEs to the value of R53.8m through the allocation of work

"This will also result in improvements in the teaching and learning environment and reduce the classroom over crowding burden faced by the client [education] department, Lusithi said.
