Former Constitutional Court judge Mbuyiseli Madlanga's judicial commission of inquiry into the pollice is set to begin proceedings on September I. The public hearings are scheduled to take place at the Bridgette Mabandla Justice College in central Petrol

The inquiry has been tasked with investigating allegations of criminality, corruption and political interference within South Africa's criminal justice system.

Its scope extends to major state institutions, including the National Prosecuting Authority (NPA), the South African Police Service (Saps) and the State Security Agency (SSA). The commission has the authority to summon individuals for testimony, among other functions, as outlined in the terms of reference published in the Government Gazette last month. A preliminary report is expected within three months, followed by a final report in six months, although the timeframe may be extended if necessary. President Cyril Ramaphosa has said the inquiry should not take longer than a year.

According to the commission, the venue is available free of charge, and the Department of Justice and Constitutional Development will handle logistical arrangements to ensure hearings start on time.
