At the information session events, participants found out more about EPWP work opportunities available to people residing in the Central Karoo.

"The Department invited work seekers living in the Central Karoo District to attend one of four information sessions on short-term EPWP training opportunities in the fields of waste management, and roadworks and building maintenance.

Rosy Jackson at the launch of her book. Rosy is a member of the well-known Jackson-family of the farm Baakensrug in the Nelspoort district. The farm has been in the hands of the Jackson family since the early 1800's. Sir John Molteno, then Prime Minister of the Cape Colony, left his Karoo farming land, of which Baakensrug was a part, to his Jackson family after he became involved in politics. In her book, a very personal account, Rosy describes the journey from a fun-filled childhood on a Karoo farm to accepting and dealing with the diagnosis of a bi-polar mental condition. Her first marriage ended in rejection, and her second implodes when her illness took over after the birth of her third son. In a story that is sometimes hilarious, sometimes heart-rending, she paints an honest picture of a life teetering and then drifting out of control, until at last she finds the help she needed.
