Government's contract with the people of South Africa is to demonstrate responsive governance and reveal the side of government that cares, protects and serves. Our philosophy as government is to facilitate equal access for all to opportunities designed to benefit every citizen. Access to job opportunities is central to participative nation building because jobs lessen dependency on welfare of the state and ensure that we become productive participants in our own development and human fulfilment.
