So in future we do not measure 'infrastructure roll-out' simply in financial and economic terms and jobs created important as this but we also purposefully plan a Built Environment which is humane in harmony with communities and the environment.

The work of the UIA continues and we now look forward to UIA2017 Seoul. We wish them well in their

endeavours and pledge our support to assisting them wherever we can in their efforts to organise the next World Congress in Seoul in 2017.
