COMMUNICATIONS AND ICT LAUNCH FIRST OF ITS KIND E-COMMS SYSTEM

The Marketing and Public Relations Unit, together with the ICT: Applications Unit, have developed a first of its kind e-Comms System, to be used by Chief Users of the department, as well as departmental staff that are responsible for procuring branded items. Yesterday, the units embarked on a two-day online session, where target users were introduced to the e-Comms System.

The e-Comms System is a platform that has been developed to simplify the process of applying for the procurement of promotional items such as T-shirts, Bottles, Folders etc. These items are branded with the departmental logo and colours, to ensure compliance with the departmental corporate identity.

The system also aims to maintain, improve and efficiently increase the consistency of corporate identity for Departmental users. The e-Comms System is expected to be officially launched across the department before the end of the current financial year.

The Marketing and Public Relations Unit in conjunction with the ICT: Applications Unit, plan to conduct roadshows that will be rolled out to all regional offices, with the purpose of engaging and training stakeholders on how to effectively use the e-Comms System.

During the online session, Ms Tumisang Nisele, Deputy Director of Marketing and Public Relations, said “The e-Comms system, assures a paperless transaction of procurement. It saves information therefore making it



easy to track and refer back to each step of the procurement process. It is simply designed to make procurement easier users to visualise the items they seek to procure.”

“Furthermore documents stored on the system, such as the corporate identity manual will assure the correct application of the departmental brand, and extend knowledge on the departmental corporate identity to users,” She added.

During the roadshows, primary stakeholders are supply chain practitioners who will play a vital role in cautioning all users of the e-Comms System and assist with various enquiries that may come up while using the system” said Ms Nisele, during the training session.

In conclusion, IT technicians in the regions will be trained on how to resolve any user's technical challenges that may come across while using the system. Chief Users and staff members that procure branded items, will be adequately trained on how to use the System. Training dates, as well as the manual on how to use the e-Comms System will be communicated to all DPWI Staff through daily emails sent via the WorxMail and FlashMail Bulletins.

MINISTER DEAN MACPHERSON: MEDIA BRIEFING ON OUTCOMES OF MINMEC MEETING

“The announcements we are making today are all in line with the overarching goal of turning South Africa into a country under construction” these are the words Minister Dean Macpherson used at a Media Briefing in Sandton, Johannesburg.

Minister Macpherson delivered the outcomes of the MinMec meeting from across the country, was held in Limpopo. At the meeting, the Minister was joined by the Director-General of the Department, Sifiso Mdakane, the Acting Head of Infrastructure South Africa (ISA), Mameetse Masemola and the CEO of CIDB Construction Industry Development Board, Bongani Dladla.

The MinMec focused on a number of pressing issues, including updates on the ongoing fight against the construction mafia, reforms in the Expanded Public Works Programme (EPWP), and significant corruption investigations. The meeting reflects the government's commitment to transparency and accountability, addressing the challenges that have plagued the construction industry and public service sectors.

During the media briefing, Minister Macpherson placed emphasis on the construction mafia's impact on infrastructure projects being a major concern. He said the outcomes of the MinMec aim to bolster regulations and ensure that construction projects benefit the public, rather than criminal enterprises. “We have made remarkable progress to restore the rule of law at construction sites and bring an end to extortion by criminal elements,” said the Minister

“It was also universally agreed that the EPWP should be reformed to ensure that it becomes a skill-based programme,

ensuring that it places participants on a path towards permanent employment” Minister added

Minister Macpherson highlighted that the Gauteng province is leading in the construction mafia extortion cases, followed by Western Cape, KwaZulu-Natal and Eastern Cape.

He further highlighted that at least 240 arrests connected to construction mafia extortion cases have been made across the country since last year, adding that this is a testament to the dedication to eradicate criminality and corruption in infrastructure development projects.

Breakdown of cases:

“No longer can you disrupt our sites without consequences. Gauteng remains the highest contributor with 241 cases and 81 arrests, followed by the Western Cape with 198 reported cases and 73 arrests, KwaZulu-Natal is third with 102 cases and 16 arrests, and the Eastern Cape with 86 cases and six arrests. Collectively, these four provinces account for 84% of all construction mafia cases.” said Minister Macpherson.

He further thanked members of SAPS for the leading role they have played in helping to turn the tide against the construction mafia. “We have built a partnership”, he said, which is turning the tide against those who seek to inflict economic terrorism on the country.

“We will always choose to serve the people of the country over those with special and vested interests. We are in the business of joining hands to build a better country and a better future”, Minister concluded



PRESERVING THE LEGACY OF ROBBEN ISLAND: RESTORATION, HERITAGE, AND PROGRESS

Deputy Minister of Public Works and Infrastructure, Sihle Zikalala, recently visited Robben Island Museum to assess the progress of ongoing renovations, repairs, and upgrades. As a UNESCO World Heritage Site, Robben Island is a symbol of South Africa's history and resilience, having once held prominent freedom fighters such as Nelson Mandela, Walter Sisulu, and Robert Sobukwe.

Accompanied by senior officials from the Department of Public Works and Infrastructure (DPWI) and other stakeholders, Zikalala reaffirmed the government's commitment to preserving the island as a lasting monument to democracy and freedom.

A Commitment to Restoration and Heritage

The upgrades are a collaborative effort between the DPWI and the Ministry of Sports, Arts and Culture. They address serious concerns raised in 2023 about the deteriorating state of key infrastructure, including buildings, cemeteries, gardens, recreational areas, waste systems, and the historic blue stone quarry.

Zikalala expressed satisfaction with the progress made, stating: "Robben Island is not just a historical site; it is a living testimony of our nation's resilience. We must ensure that its legacy is preserved for future generations."

Meeting with the Ex-Political Prisoners Association

A significant part of the visit was Zikalala's engagement with the Ex-Political Prisoners Association (EPPA), led by Secretary Mpho Masemola and NEC members. The EPPA proposed several initiatives to strengthen the island's heritage, including:

- Restoring the seven prison golf courses, which have historical significance.
- Organizing a reunion of former political prisoners to document their stories.
- Involving ex-prisoners in restoration projects, using skills such as plumbing, carpentry, and construction they developed while imprisoned.

Zikalala welcomed the proposals and encouraged the EPPA to work closely with the Robben Island Museum Council, committing to relay their input to the Ministry of Sports, Arts and Culture.

Significant Progress in Infrastructure Upgrades

The oversight visit revealed notable improvements on the island, underscoring efforts to enhance both its preservation and visitor experience:

- **Water Supply:** For the first time, there were no water supply interruptions during the 2024 festive season—a milestone in infrastructure development.
- **Tourism Growth:** The island welcomed 86,622 visitors between November 2024 and January 2025, signalling renewed public interest thanks to improved facilities.
- **Desalination Plant:** The island's plant has been fully upgraded, and new filtration systems ensure sustainable and clean water access.

These enhancements are essential for maintaining Robben Island as a heritage site and as a growing tourist attraction.

Looking ahead, several initiatives are being developed to preserve the island's legacy and support sustainable use:

1. **Accommodation for Researchers and Tourists**
The government is exploring converting selected buildings into accommodation for researchers, conservationists, and tourists, supporting ongoing heritage and environmental work.
2. **Harbor and Electrical System Upgrades**
Plans are in place to modernize harbour infrastructure for safer ferry services and to upgrade electrical systems to support energy efficiency.
3. **Honouring Former Political Prisoners**
A proposal to rename pathways on the island after former political prisoners aims to embed their stories permanently into the site's identity.
4. **Strengthening Conservation Efforts**
Conservation plans include protecting indigenous plants and ensuring that restoration work follows environmental best practices.

A United Commitment to Robben Island's Legacy

Zikalala concluded his visit by affirming that the government will continue its restoration efforts under the leadership of the Ministry of Sports, Arts and Culture. "Our goal is to ensure that Robben Island remains a beacon of history and a testament to South Africa's rich heritage for future generations," he said.

With visible infrastructure improvements, collaborative heritage preservation efforts, and a deep respect for the island's past, Robben Island is steadily being revitalised as a living monument that continues to inspire and educate all who visit.



DIRECTOR - GENERAL SIFISO MDAKANE EMBARKS ON THE DURBAN HIGH COURT OVERSITE VISIT

Infrastructure development and human capital empowerment were in the spotlight as the Director-General Sifiso Mdakane visited two key construction sites in on 29 March 2025; the Durban High Court precinct, and the Department of Labour Centre. The oversight visit was led by Thuthuka Mbhele, Director of Projects in the Durban Regional Office.

The Durban High Court project, a catalytic infrastructure initiative, is now 75% complete and is already making a tangible impact beyond bricks and mortar. Under the project, 29 artisans have been trained and are set to receive formal certification by the end of the construction phase. Notably, one young female professional achieved her SACPCMP registration, while two female student architects, placed with the principal agent consultant, have since registered professionally with SACAP. One of them has progressed to become a director at a private architectural practice, a testament to the project's role in creating career pathways.

The expansion of the Durban High Court is set to significantly improve access to justice in the region. Once

completed, the precinct will feature additional courtrooms, administrative offices, public areas, and parking facilities, much-needed upgrade to support growing legal demands.

The Director-General also assessed progress at the Durban Labour Centre, where visible improvements have been made. Three previously non-functional lifts are now operational, ceilings have been replaced, and air conditioning systems have been upgraded throughout most of the building. Only three floors remain to be completed before the refurbishment is finalised.

Director General Mdakane expressed his satisfaction with the quality and pace of the work and provided strategic guidance to ensure the successful and timely delivery of both projects. His visit highlighted the department's commitment not only to infrastructure delivery but also to empowerment, transformation, and improved public service access.

INFORMATION AND COMMUNICATION TECHNOLOGY STRATEGIC SESSION CHARTS A ROADMAP TO IMPROVE ICT INNOVATION AND OPERATIONS IN DPWI

The ICT Chief Directorate conducted a three-day strategic planning session aimed at improving operations and capacitating the department's ICT services. The three-day session was held from 12 February to 14 February 2025 at the department's ICT facility/ offices in Johannesburg.

The aim of the session was to address numerous critical challenges and weaknesses which hamper the efficiency of the ICT operations in the department and therefore, demoralising the employees' confidence in obtaining quality service from ICT.

The session comprised of the department's regional offices representatives who were delegated to outline, engage and source resolutions for their respective offices as they encounter numerous challenges due to lack of adequate resources which is counter productive to their work output and subsequently affect their key performance areas.

The Internal audit, finance unit, strategic planning unit also gave advice on critical and complex financial issues which affect budgeting and the procurement of ICT equipment. This also serves to align the ICT strategy to the department's overall strategy.

Some of the focal areas of interest flagged during the session comprised of the following:

- lack of support and communication from head office to regional offices,
- Performance and efficiency of ICT operations,
- lack of UPS (Uninterrupted Power Supply) in some regional offices when there's electricity issues and/or load shedding,
- over reliance on consultants at expense of hiring and empowering young people in the department,
- overstretching of technicians as a result of staff shortages,
- duplicating of duties and responsibilities within ICT unit,
- cyber attacks on ICT system in which led to department losing money,
- poor network coverage which affects operations and hinders service delivery,

- non-alignment of units within ICT due to lack of synergy which lead to parallel processes and delays,
- lack of policy regarding the lost and recovery of ICT equipment,
- ICT's slow pace in keeping abreast with new ICT technical advancement.

Speaking at the session, DDG for GRC Lwazi Mahlangu, mapped a roadmap which the department needs to adhere to in order to ascend to the summit of ICT excellence which will set the department on an upward trajectory which resonates with the ICT's core function of efficient, reliable and technological advancement.

He further highlighted that the session forms part of Minister Dean Macpherson's vision in line with 7th administration for ICT priorities which aim to enhance and support the organisation's ICT services, performance plan, restructuring of ICT to provide support and improve efficiencies.

The ICT audit findings proved to be a thorny issue as the Deputy Director General earmarked it as a challenge for the department as a resulted in the low point which led to the cyber attack which led to the department losing R300 million. He called for the strengthening of ICT anti-cyber attack systems to keep up with current trends so that we prevent such incidents from reoccurring.



DPWI Celebrates Library Week: A Tribute to Knowledge, Innovation, and Community Engagement

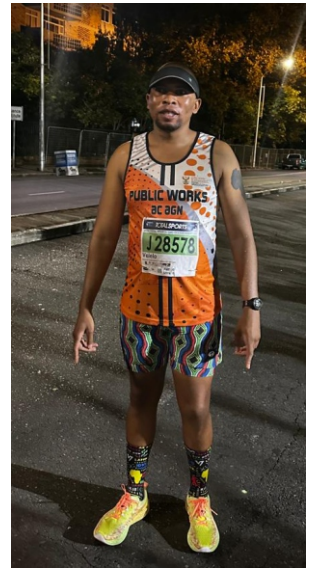

PORTFOLIO COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC WORKS AND INFRASTRUCTURE INSPECTS DPWI PROJECT IN THE EASTERN CAPE

The Portfolio Committee on Public Works and Infrastructure has undertaken an oversight visit to the Eastern Cape, visiting a number of projects under the management of the Department of Public Works and Infrastructure (DPWI). The visits in Lusikisiki, Port St Johns, and Mthatha were aimed at physically inspecting projects that the Department report on in Parliament, holding the department accountable where there are challenges.

The Portfolio Committee first visited Port St Johns, a small coastal town rich with biodiversity, that has been identified as one of the areas in the province for a Small harbour development. The Portfolio Committee was briefed on the plans of the development and how it would benefit the municipality. From there, they visited a State property that has been illegally occupied. They concluded the day with a visit to a housing project completed in 2017/18, by the DPWI entity Agreement SA.

On Day 2, the Committee visited the Mbotyi Welisizwe bridge in Lusikisiki under the Ngquza Hill local municipality, to inspect the recently completed bridge. There, they were briefed that in the Eastern Cape, 13 of the 17 Welisizwe bridges currently under construction have been completed with the remaining 5 bridges at various stages of near completion. The Committee was also told about various challenges faced during the construction of the bridges including inclement weather and bad road conditions.

On the final day of the oversight visit tour, the Portfolio committee visited the Mthatha Magistrates court which underwent a rebuilding and renovation project following a fire that destroyed part of the court complex. They also visited a paving project in the Mthatha CBD, inspecting the quality of the work while engaging the workers about their conditions of employment.

Officials present at the Portfolio Committee oversight meetings and site visits included those from the Department of Public Works and Infrastructure led by the Mthatha Regional Manager Nolzwi Hlengwa, Eastern Cape Office of the Premier, Provincial Department of Public Works and Infrastructure together with officials from local and district municipalities.

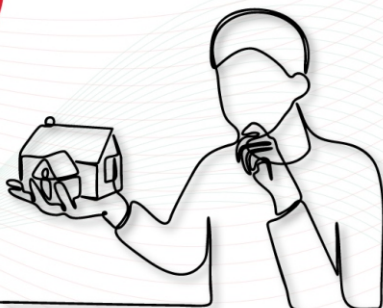


