Ronnie the communicator knew the journalists, and the institutions they worked for. I remember when I requested sound bites, he would always sign off by saying "Ronnie Mamoepa Gagasi 99.5 FM news, New York", and there was never a dull moment when Ronnie was around.

When I joined government communications, I worked very closely with him while he was at the Department of Home Affairs and later when he joined the Presidency. A workaholic, Ronnie was always on the lookout for new blood to boost government communications. Having a radio background, Ronnie tried to poach me to the Department of Home Affairs to assist with their radio station. This is because he had a good vision for government communications.

At gatherings, he would always want me accompany him to get fresh air. Now with Ronnie, getting fresh air meant talking 'work, work, work'!!!. I have learnt a lot from him and there was still more to learn. He once told me that no matter what you communicate to the citizens, if there is no trust between government and the citizens, that communication effort will not make an impact.

A true gentleman who was always available to assist, we are indeed poorer without you son of the soil. Death has robbed us of a motivator, an honest man and a dedicated civil servant.

Farewell my Friend, we will continue where you have left off. Your legacy will be passed on to generations. You will always be in our thoughts, you may be gone but you will not be forgotten.

May your peaceful soul rest in eternal peace.

DPW MEN JOIN THE FIGHT AGAINST WOMEN AND CHILDREN ABUSE

ale staff members of the Department of Public Works (DPW) based in the Departmental headquarters in Pretoria gathered recently to say No to Gender-Based Violence.

The event was organised by the Gender Unit to call on all DPW men to stand tall and fight the scourge. Men wore black coloured clothing as a sign of support for those who have survived this kind of violence.

Corporate Services Deputy Director-General, Mr Sam Vukela – leading the DPW men's fight against the abuse of women and Children, said all the male colleagues in the Department were not isolated from the rest of the society and therefore what happened in the society affected everyone.

"We are not different from everyone. We are influenced by the communities that we come from and we would like to thank the Gender Unit for convening such a gathering," said Mr Vukela.

He said gender-based violence was happening everywhere, and that as a country; South Africa had taken a stand to combat this problem. Mr Vukela said he had been briefed that DPW came up with a forum to look at addressing gender-based violence, and that he believed that even people who were dragging their feet would end up following. "We need the advocates who would help in addressing this issue. Leaders need to be guided too so that every decision taken is gender-based guided. Let's go and mobilise others to join in this fight," the DDG urged.

In another national event to show a stand against gender-based violence, the Minister of Women Ms Suzan Shabangu said while men were primarily seen as the nurtures of boys, women also needed to be involved. Both parents had to be responsible in raising their kids. The Minister also called on the police officers to take the plight of men who have been abused just as seriously as that of women and children.





"We are all human beings, we all feel the pain and we all need protection. Men are determined to work alongside women to fight against gender-based violence, as well as to play a part in encouraging others to do the same," the Minister said.

Parent 24.com has also reported that according to a UCT report, survey data suggests that more children have suffered abuse in the hands of the caregivers, teachers or relatives.

With 18, 6 million children under the age 18 at the last census count, the data suggests that potentially 9.3 million children in South Africa have suffered gender-based violence.

MINISTER NHLEKO SPENDS HIS 67 MINUTES FOR MADIBA AT SOLLOG

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EASTERN CAPE LEADS IN THE EFFECTIVE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE EPWP – DEPUTY PRESIDENT RAMAPHOSA SAYS

he Eastern Cape was one of the biggest generator of Expanded Public Works Programme (EPWP) work opportunities in the country during the 2016/17 financial year, said Deputy President Cyril Ramaphosa.

Speaking during the EPWP project site visit in Whittlesea in the Eastern Cape on 09 June 2017, Deputy President Ramaphosa said the province "must be commended for being a leader in the effective implementation of the EPWP".

"We have thousands of people in the province who are participating in the EPWP. Through the Programme, our people are not only gaining work experience and training but they are also contributing in the delivery of socio-economic developmental assets and services. It is also important to highlight the fact that the Eastern Cape has been able to spread the Programme to the poorest of the poor in the most rural parts of the province," Deputy President Ramaphosa said.

Deputy President Ramaphosa explained that community members who are part of the EPWP were engaged in various projects in the four EPWP Sectors.

"One of the most impressive EPWP projects is Nomaxabiso White Door Centre of Hope – a Non-Governmental Organisation (NGO)- which we have visited at the Whittlesea Police Station. This NGO is a shelter for abused women and children. The work they do includes counselling for victims of abuse, creating community awareness around the issue of abuse of women and children. In fact the work they do is at the heart of caring and empowering the community," Deputy President said.

He indicated that the government would work hard to ensure that the NGO is provided with proper shelter to house victims of abuse. "We will also try to resolve the challenge of transport that the NGO has raised with us," Deputy President Ramaphosa added.

The EPWP site visit was part of the Public Employment Programme Inter-Ministerial Committee (PEP-IMC) event which is chaired by Deputy President Ramaphosa. The event was attended by a number of senior government leaders including Minister of Agriculture, Forestry and Fisheries Mr Senzeni Zokwana, Deputy Minister of Telecommunications and Postal Services Ms Stella Ndabeni-Abrahams, Deputy Minister of Rural Development and Land Reform Mr Mcebisi Skwatsha, as well as Eastern Cape Premier Mr Phumulo Masualle and various MECs from the province.

Deputy President and his delegation also visited an EPWP sewing project in Ncedisizwe NGO in Whittlesea where they interacted with participants who are doing a number of community developmental activities such as sewing and beadwork.

Earlier in the day, the Deputy President and Minister Ndabeni-Abrahams handed over a cyber-lab at the Zamokuhle Senior Secondary School.

The cyber-lab comes complete with mobile tablet devises to allow the learners at the school to participate in the government's e-learning programme. "Look after these devises and use them to learn as much as you can about the world. You must use education to liberate and develop yourselves and your communities," Deputy President Ramaphosa told the learners.



Deputy Minister Ndabeni-Abrahams said the cyber-lab was another innovative way that government was bringing technology to rural schools. The learners expressed excitement about the mobile tablets they had received and promised the Deputy President that they would use them to learn as much as they could.

Have you ever driven past the Voorberg Prison sign on the R44 and wondered where the road will take you to? Voorberg Prison sign on the R44 road is for a Correctional Centre about 10 km from Piketberg in Western Cape. It houses more than 2000 male offenders and administrative personnel who live on the property.

Although situated in the Bergriver Local Municipality, Voorberg is largely self-sufficient in terms of services. The buildings are owned and maintained by the Department of Public Works. The Department is also mandated to operate and maintain water services and, as such, it is expected to comply with legislation and the Green Drop programme of the Department of Water and Sanitation.

Voorberg has its own wastewater treatment plant. On average, 1522 cubic metres of wastewater enters the plant per day. The wastewater is mainly domestic although the facility has an abattoir on site as well as a dairy which produces about 1250 litres of milk per day. The abattoir slaughters sheep, pigs and cattle and this wastewater is discharged to a septic tank whose gravity feeds to a pump station from where it is pumped to the plant. The dairy wastewater does not go to the plant. It is collected in a dam which is used for irrigation.

The plant discharges its effluent into the Vier-en-Twintig River which joins the Berg River a few kilometres further downstream. Many Western Cape farmers depend on water from the Berg River to irrigate crops for the export market. It is essential to maintain the required water quality standards for effluent that discharges into the river, because the European Union and other importing countries only import products that meet their health standards for irrigated crops.



The Voorberg plant is performing relatively well. The site and buildings are clean and well looked after; there are no bad odours. The sludge ponds have recently been cleaned and a new mechanical screen is being installed. The process controllers are enthusiastic and proud of their work. Unfortunately, the plant receives more wastewater than it is designed for, making it impossible to achieve the required compliance.

The leadership of the Department of Public Works is however taking action. It has embarked on a national Green Drop Project to improve its wastewater services in all 11 regions. The Green Drop Project is led by a team of wastewater experts from the Entsika-WaterGroup consortium.

These experts have audited the Voorberg plant, and will be empowering the Department and the process controllers to take the plant to full compliance and Green Drop status by 2021.

MULTILINGUALISM AT WORK IN DPW By Mashite Mogale

xpressing yourself in any of the official languages including South African Sign Language and Braille will become a norm within the Department of Public Works family. This follows the successful language policy implementation workshops conducted across all the DPW regions.

The aim of the workshops was to present the language policy to the regions and to sensitise staff and management about the approved policy and its implications especially on the promotion of access to information, and DPW services in all Official Languages as per Section 6 of the Constitution of the Republic of South Africa.

The audience who attended the language policy implementation workshop in all the regions were the regional staff members, the Pan

South African Language Board, a Chapter 9 institution that monitors and create conditions for the development of previously marginalised languages and the Provincial Departments of Arts and Culture, the custodian of languages in all the nine provinces.

The workshop emphasised the urgent need to comply with the Use of Official Languages Act 12 of 2012 that compels all national government department, national public entities and national public enterprises to effect Section 6 of the constitutional clause that regulates languages by Promoting the equitable use of the 11 official languages which are Sepedi, Setswana, Sesotho, isiZulu, isiXhosa, isiNdebele, Siswati, Tshivenda, Xitsonga, English and Afrikaans including South African Sign Language and Braille.

To that effect the DPW will from the current financial year onwards implement its language policy through an implementation plan by providing the following services:

- o Translation
- o Interpreting
- Terminology development
- o Advise on language training
- o Language policy development
- Promoting Language awareness events such as Mother Language day, Deaf Awareness week, International Translation Day and Language of the Day.

The DPW will also work closely with PanSALB and Provincial Departments of Arts and Culture to ensure that the policy is in line with the language needs of each province and complies with provincial language policies.

Consequently PanSALB will monitor and evaluate the implementation of the DPW Language Policy nationally and provide guidance whenever a need arises.

Proceedings of the language policy workshops in the regions



he Directorate Human Resource Development (HRD) with the help of International Relations unit continues to help develop and expand the level of skills in the Department of Public Works community.

One of the directorate's mandate, loosely explained, is to promote skills development in the workplace. From time to time, the Department through the (HRD) unit grants opportunities to its employees to develop their skills in different fields.

One of the lucky recipients of such a great opportunity is Mr Gitech Brijman, who is currently with the Department as a Control Geographical Information Science (GISc) Technologist.

In September 2016, Gitesh went to India, Dehradun, to attend the Indian Technical Economic Training (ITEC) programme in GISc at the Indian Institute of Remote Sensing (IIRS).

GISc is the scientific discipline that studies data structures and computational techniques to capture, represent, process, and analyse geographic information. It can be contrasted with geographic information systems, which are software tools.

The skills Gitesh gained from such an experience include developing and implementing GIS applications that are centric and distributed, using GIS to streamline business processes. They also include developing and maintaining GIS intelligence to allow decision makers to make informed decisions around complex scenarios.

The Department issued a training invitation for the ITEC (Indian Technical Economic Cooperation) programme in 2005 and training in this programme was fully sponsored by the Commonwealth through the Indian Government.

"I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Department of Public Works for approving my ITEC training in India. Although I am an experienced GISc Technologist, I learnt and explored GIS at Reconnecting with the universe- from slaves to the rulers of the world! is a book that calls on all Africans, both in Africa and the Diaspora, to overcome the challenges that have plagued the African people since the oppression days, through slavery, colonialization and apartheid, to the present day.

This eye-opening book was written by Mr Maputle Maphutha, who is based at the Kimberley Regional Office, appointed as an Assistant Director: Occupational Health and Safety (OHS) – Electrical.

Mr Maphutha has been writing for over five years now. "I have always been putting something on paper. RECONNECTING WITH THE UNIVERSE

WHAT YOU CAN LOSE WHEN YOU RESIGN

1. Monthly pension:

You will only receive a once-off lump sum payment, called a gratuity, rather than receiving your lump sum and monthly pension, called annuities (the monthly pension payments are for life). Your spouse or life partner will also not receive anything from GEPF after you pass away, whereas they would have received 50% or 75% of your monthly pension, based on your choice on retirement, for as long as they live.

3.

Funeral benefits

GEPF pays a funeral benefit to help its members and pensioners pay the funeral costs when a GEPF member or pensioner dies. These benefits are also paid out on the death of the spouse, life partner or eligible child of a member or pensioner. This benefit is not paid if you resign. The primary role of GEPF is to protect the wealth of our members and pensioners by safeguarding your retirement benefits through proper administration and prudent investment.

There are a number of benefits to retiring with GEPF, including access to non-contributory benefits such as funeral benefits, orphan's and spouse's / lifetime partner's pensions, etc.

GEPF has different benefits that you will lose if you resign instead of retiring. If you have more than 10 years ofservice and you decide to resign rather than retire, you will lose the following benefits offered by GEPF:

2. Medical aid subsidy:

You will not re ceive any contributions towards your medical aid from the state if you resign. If you have 15 or more years of service you may have been eligible to receive a government subsidy towards your monthly medical aid membership for the rest of your life when you retire.


