Let us change some practices in order to end Gender-Based Violence

The Government has once again affirmed its commitment to work with all stakeholders to ensure that South Africa dramatically reduces levels of Gender-Based Violence (GBV) and ultimately eradicate it; as well as end discrimination and violence against women and children.

Deliberations of the Presidential Gender-Based Violence and Femicide Summit held in early November 2018, saw government agreeing to conducting a review of national plans to end Gender-Based Violence and develop a National Action Plan on GBV.

With the country marking the 16 Days of Activism for No Violence against Women and Children between 25 November and 10 December; I would like to urge all DPW officials to join the rest of the country and work towards changing attitudes and some practices that hinder us from successfully fighting Gender-Based Violence. Gender-Based Violence include unwanted verbal advances to physical acts of violence. Unwanted verbal advances also include unwelcome graphic comments about a person's body and unwelcome whistling directed at a person.

The 16 Days of Activism Campaign is, this year, held under the theme *#HearMeToo: A violence-free world for women*. I encourage women to raise awareness about this scourge by sharing their stories so that other women can be encouraged to speak out.

GORDON'S BAY HARBOUR GETS A FACE LIFT TO ENHANCE ITS ECONOMIC VALUE

Lives of local community members around the Gordon's Bay harbour in Cape Town will never be the same following a massive restoration project at the harbour.

This emerged during Public Works Minister TW Nxesi's visit to the area. The Minister was accompanied to the site visit and interactive community engagement session at the harbour by the Deputy Director-General (DDG): Small Harbours and State Coastal Properties, Mr Samuel Thobakgale on 10 October 2018.

The purpose of the site inspection was to primarily evaluate the dredging renovations and refurbishment of the harbour and showcase the Department's commitment in ensuring that South Africa's harbours are rehabilitated and transformed so as to retain their pristine condition and provide an economic stimulus to the local communities.

Public Works has mandated state-owned enterprise Coega to implement the project on its behalf to conduct dredging activities at the harbour. Dredging is the process of removing sand build-up on the seabed and rehabilitation of the beach to restore its pristine condition.

During his keynote address, Minister Nxesi revealed that the Department had 12 proclaimed harbours in the Western Cape. "We must ensure ongoing maintenance of these harbours. Small Medium and Micro-Enterprises were empowered to the value of R3,5 million on the dredging project. South Africa belongs to all of us therefore white exploitation must not be replaced by black exploitation," the Minister explained.

The significance of the dredging and renovation programme has yielded a number of positive socio-economic impacts for local communities such as: the creation of job opportunities; development of small harbours in growing the economy as part of Operation Phakisa and empowering local communities by contributing towards poverty alleviation.

Speaking during the event, the Cape Town Acting Regional Manager Ms Nomalanga Kani said her region would, as part of its commitment, engage communities to explore and take advantage of economic opportunities available in the ocean economy sector.

DPW LAUNCHES THE GREEN BUILDING POLICY TO FOSTER SUSTAINABILITY IN THE SECTOR

The Department of Public Works (DPW) officially launched the Green Building policy on the 3rd of October 2018 during the annual Green Building Convention Council of South Africa Conference in Cape Town, in the Western Cape. The launch is the biggest calendar event in the Green Building sector. The Public Works Green Building Policy was approved by Minister TW Nxesi in June 2018.

The policy aims to provide leadership in sustainable building sector; efficient energy, water and waste management, indoor environmental quality and comfort, ensuring sustainable product and materials management.

The Department of Public Works introduced a Green Building Framework which was launched in 2011 during COP17 (the 17th meeting of the Conference of the Parties) in Durban, working in partnership with the Council for Scientific and Industrial Research (CSIR).

The document assisted in providing a broad framework which helped to contextualise the approach to sustainable building – to ensure an integrated approach to Green Building and to meet requirements of other Public Works functions i.e. Utilities Management.

Speaking on behalf of the Minister, the Department's Chief Director Facilities Management Mr Nkosana Kubeka said that a team comprising of officials from the Department of Public Works, Agrément SA and the Construction Industry Development Board (CIDB) is currently undertaking a benchmarking study in Australia to look at the best model to emulate in the South African context – driving development of a new industry.

He went on to say that, the most important part of the Green Building initiative was to ensure partnerships with industry organisations, support of the financial services sector, cooperation with international partners, and alignment with other Government programmes.

This includes working with the Department of Trade and Industry (DTI) on supporting local manufacturing, particularly of designated products and the Department of Science and Technology on Research & Development (R&D) and use of Indigenous Knowledge Systems (IKS) in the context of Green Building.



MINISTER VISITS POLOKWANE REGIONAL OFFICE

Public Works Minister, Honourable TW Nxesi, MP has reminded staff at the Polokwane Regional Office that they are important, saying they make the work of the Department happen. He visited the Regional Office on the 12th of October where he met with the regional manager and senior managers before addressing the rest of the staff.

In his address to staff, the Minister emphasised that since his return to the Department earlier in the year, his focus has been on fighting corruption, adding that he brought on board the Special Investigating Unit (SIU) through the President (of the country) to start with investigations in the Department.

Some of the things he spoke about was the establishment of a National High Performance Centre and that this has been recommended as an immediate intervention to accelerate the Turnaround Strategy on the ground, improving the customer experience and delivering improved service in the Property Management Trading Entity (PMTE) which covers construction, maintenance and leasing.

The Minister also embarked on a site visit to the Makweng Police Station Project. He was accompanied by the Polokwane Regional Manager Mr Musa Ntshani and his project team as well as the Chief Director of Project Construction Management from Head Office Mr Wasnaar Hlabangwane.

Under the project, the Department is upgrading an existing Police Station including project 5 Star with all the building related work, civil infrastructure, electrical installation, including security systems and the full mechanical installation. The project has experienced delays and is 17 months behind, mainly due to the following factors:

- Community unrest due to municipal account and political influence.
- Labour strike due to increment and not finding the correct skills required within the community.
- Testing of suspected human remains that were found on site.
- Changing of the scope due to the latest South African Police Service (SAPS) five star specifications.
- Variation orders.

The Region has revealed that the employment targets for local labour have been met. Under the project, the recruited learners (60 NYS) have graduated and 5 left for greener pastures.

The progress on site is 83% (as of September 2018) and expenditure is at 84%. (June 2018)

Minister Nxesi said while he was happy with the progress on the project- given the challenges encountered, the experience still challenges the Departmental team to ensure that the delivery of the project is done on a reasonable time frame.



DG MEETS PRETORIA REGIONAL OFFICE

The Department of Public Works' Director-General (DG) Advocate Sam Vukela has assigned the Human Resources unit at the Departmental headquarters in Pretoria to establish a plan on how the DPW structure can accommodate Artisans. This follows his visit to the Pretoria Regional Office as well as the regional Workshop on 05 September 2018.

During his visit, the DG engaged with the Artisans (i.e. plumbers, pipe fitters, welders etc.) and addressed the Pretoria Regional Office staff. He was accompanied by Deputy Director-General (DDG): Facilities Management, Ms Nyeleti Makhubele and other senior managers from various units at Head Office.

The DG wanted to hear the concerns of staff members and tackle issues that the Regional Office may be facing in relation to the services they render to the public.

Some of the key concerns raised by staff were related to job evaluation, skills transfers and budget issues. One major concern was of the Artisans training at the region's Workshop, as the contract (for the training) with the Department was coming to an end.

The DG reminded the Artisans that they were doing important jobs and therefore the Department needed them. "We need you [Artisans] to serve the Department and therefore plan to minimise the use of contractors by the Department," said the DG.

Advocate Vukela mentioned that while he could not give all the answers on the spot to every issue raised; he would ensure that the team of managers who accompanied him find a way to resolve these, so that the work environment would not affect service delivery and eventually, the mandate of the Department.

KIMBERLEY REGIONAL OFFICE ON THE RIGHT TRAJECTORY, SAYS DEPUTY MINISTER CRONIN

On the 13th of September 2018, Deputy Minister (DM), Jeremy Cronin embarked on one of his regional visits to the Kimberley Regional Office in the Northern Cape Province. The purpose of the visit was to share with the Regional Office the direction the Department was taking, and to also get the views of the region in terms of their work, challenges and successes.

The Deputy Minister who was visibly ill due to a strain of flu, defied the Doctor's orders to be at the regional office which is something that was noted and commended by one of the staff members, Ms Rosette Samson, who is an Acting Assistant Director: Key Account Management (KAM). The DM's visit had two phases, the first one being the meeting with the Regional Manager and her management team which was followed by an open meeting with the entire staff compliment.

The DM who was warmly received by the Regional Manager, Ms Ruwayda Baulackey was accompanied on his visit by Ms Swanzie Matthews, Deputy Director-General: Real Estate Information and Registry Services (REIRS), Mr Solly Mwanza, Director: Human Resource Development (HRD), Mr Deon Viljoen: Director in the Office of the Deputy Minister, Mr Thando Wababa: Media Liaison Officer (MLO), Mr Donald Baikgaki, Acting Director: Human Capital Investment (HCI) and Ms Nazley Davids, Private Secretary to the Deputy Minister. Ms Baulakey in her address expressed her gratitude on behalf of the region, for being visited by a Principal, which is a rare occasion. She also expressed the determination of her staff and capable management team that is ready to take the region forward.

What was clear from this visit was that there were a number of

challenges, which includes but not limited to, inadequate staff establishment. Among the challenges expressed by both the management team and the staff in general are three major ones. Firstly, there is a general concern over centralisation of functions of authority at Head Office in Pretoria. The feeling is that centralisation in its current form is not working and therefore, it should be revisited, re-engineered and aligned because dynamics are different from region to region, and there is generally a delay in getting approvals from Head Office. Secondly, it was an issue of systems.

The view is that DPW's systems are not talking to each other and Information System (IS) was cited as an area that needed an urgent attention and that the Chief Directorate needed to take the lead in rectifying this problem. The last one was the issue of workshop revitalisation. The view is that the Department had trained artisans that can assist it in attending to issues of service delivery speedily, avoiding the embarrassment that the Department is sometimes subjected to, that of not being able to attend to small maintenance jobs that can be resolved without appointing a service provider, but by using in-house artisans instead.

In the midst of all the challenges at the Kimberley Regional Office, among the good stories to tell is that of 100% payment of all contractors within 30 days, which they consistently maintain without fail. In wrapping up his visit in Kimberley, the Deputy Minister thanked the Regional Manager, her team of managers and the entire staff for their honesty in talking about these issues. He also thanked them for their professionalism and the warm reception they gave him.

IGR CONDUCTS A 2-DAY WORKSHOP TO RESOLVE SERVICE DELIVERY CHALLENGES

The Department of Public Works' (DPW) staff under the Intergovernmental Relations (IGR) Unit has been urged to work together to ensure that members of the public receive proper service. To that effect, the unit hosted a two-day workshop in the Eastern Cape, Buffalo City District from 26 to 27 September 2018 to deal with service delivery challenges head-on.

The workshop gave delegates an opportunity to discuss how the IGR Unit can work better with the Public Works sector. The two-day session also served as a platform to network with relevant stakeholders. It sought to assist the sector to come up with an informed programme of action to resolve service delivery challenges focusing on the role of the three spheres of government, i.e., municipalities, the provincial and national government.

The workshop was hosted under the theme: **“Towards integrated policy, planning and coordinated implementation approach for efficient and effective service delivery”**. The IGR branch provides Parliamentary and Nedlac (National Economic Development and Labour Council) support. Officially opening the workshop, IGR Chief Director Mr Adam Mthombeni outlined the objectives of the gathering which, among others, included the following:

- Consistent with the Workshop theme- strive to work together for service delivery.
- Platform for technical support, knowledge, expertise and sharing in matters of mutual interest.

- Sharing information on infrastructure delivery.
- Pursue common objectives on the delivery of plans of action for government.
- Interactive platform for invited stakeholders - IGR partners, DPW entities.
- Follow through with stakeholders on the NCOP (National Council of Provinces) visitation in the province.
- Leverage dialogues on sector cross-cutting programmes.
- Share information on current policy developments in the sector.
- Promote dialogue with DPW entities and some line functions on their programmes.

The Acting HOD for the Eastern Cape Department of Public Works, Mr Mahlubandile Dickson Qwase encouraged everyone to really focus and work together to ensure that service delivery gets to the people of this country.

The Intergovernmental Relations Unit has hailed the workshop as a success, as it was well attended by municipalities, other departments and the DPW Family, including the four entities (the Independent Development Trust, the Council for the Built Environment, the Construction Industry Development Board and Agreement South Africa) who participated in the dialogues. The unit is planning to roll-out the workshops across all provinces.

DPW DEVELOPS THE INTEGRITY MANAGEMENT FRAMEWORK TO ACCELERATE SERVICE DELIVERY

The Department of Public Works' (DPW) Deputy Director-General (DDG): Governance, Risk and Compliance Mr Imtiaz Fazel says the Department has developed the Integrity-Management Framework (IMF) – following the new Public Service Regulations of 2017. The DDG says the intervention is a major catalyst that seeks to alter the mindset and organisational culture of the Department towards service delivery and Batho Pele principles, as well as to establish a new ethical foundation in the organisation.

He was addressing staff members during an event to mark the Public Service Month at the Departmental headquarters in Pretoria on 12 September 2018. The service delivery initiative is commemorated annually in the month of September and this year's Public Service Month was celebrated under the theme **"Thuma Mina": Taking Public Service to the People – Batho Pele: "We Belong, We Care, We Serve."** The Public Service Month (PSM) is an integrated strategic national event in the calendar of the Department of Public Service and Administration (DPSA).

The DDG says the draft of the Integrity Management Framework (IMF) was discussed at the Executive Committee (EXCO) level. He says it will be placed on the Departmental website and all DPW staff will be invited to submit their comments and inputs. He also reminded the DPW staff that this year's Public Service Month falls in the centenary of both Nelson Mandela and Albertina Sisulu and that it was therefore important to inculcate the value of service and dignity in our work, which was espoused by Nelson Mandela, as well as to continue to take services to the people just as Mama Albertina Sisulu did.

The DPW Head Office Public Service Month commemoration ended with the staff members signing a pledge to the Public Service Charter. By signing the pledge, the public servants committed themselves to, among others: Act against fraud, corruption, nepotism, maladministration and any other act which constitutes an offense, or which is prejudicial to the public interest- as well as to respect and protect every person's dignity and rights as contained in the Constitution.

Autobiography

Our roots

The Council for the Built Environment (CBE) owes its existence to the Council for the Built Environment CBE Act (Act No. 43 of 2000) which was passed by Parliament in November 2000. Together with all the other changes that accompanied the demise of the apartheid regime in South Africa came the need to regulate, monitor and transform the building and construction sector. Thus the CBE was created as an organisation in September 2001 to carry out the provisions of the CBE Act.

What's in a name?

Long names, whether of people, places or entities, have a tendency to be shortened into acronyms, and the long winded Council for the Built Environment is no exception. Thus:

Council for the Built Environment = CBE

Then, what we millennials knew colloquially as the building and construction sector has been formalised to the 'built environment'. So:

Building and construction (old) = built environment (neo)

Who we are?

CBE is a government entity, attached to the Department of Public Works. It assists to carry out some of the functions of the Department of Public Works. Therefore the CBE reports to and is accountable to the Minister of Public Works. It is governed by the same rules and regulations that apply to all other government institutions.

What we do?

Essentially the CBE is government's appointed custodian of the built environment, playing the role of public protector. The aims of the CBE are to promote the following causes:

- Historically disadvantaged individuals to claim a greater share of the entrepreneurial space in the construction sector.
- Built environment fields are an attractive career choice for school learners.
- Race and gender imbalance is redressed in the sector by increasing numbers of non-white and women practitioners achieving professionally registered status.
- Life-long learning and the recognition thereof is the norm.
- Protecting the public from collusive cartels and unacceptable standards of work delivered.
- Research, policy, education, international collaboration to keep dated with best practice and a built environment relevant to South Africa's geo-political landscape.
- Overseeing the Councils for the Built Environment Professions (CBEP). Put simplistically, architecture, engineering, project and construction management, landscape architecture, property valuation and quantity surveying are the six disciplines of the built environment. Each of these disciplines are regulated by their own professional body called a council, these being:

ECSA	Engineering Council of South Africa
SACAP	South African Council for the Architectural Profession
SACLAP	South African Council for the Landscape Architectural Profession
SACPVP	South African Council for the Property Valuers Profession
SACPCMP	South African Council for the Project and Construction Management Professions
SACQSP	South African Council for the Quantity Surveying Profession

Each of these councils are constituted in terms of their individual professions Acts, and is headed by a Registrar. CBE maintains an oversight role to ensure that these CBEP exercise integrity and compliance in all areas of their operations.

Our leadership

CBE is led by a twenty member Council to provide effective leadership for an ethical foundation of the organisation. Members, representing Public Works and relevant government departments, built environment disciplines, and the public are appointed through a formal process as stipulated in the CBE Act. The Minister of Public Works appoints the Chairperson and Deputy Chairperson. The duration of each Council's term is four years. Currently, the fourth term Council is in office.
