DPWI is repairing an aeroplane in mid-flight!



In her inaugural Budget Vote Speech in July 2019, the Public Works and Infrastructure (DPWI) Minister Patricia De Lille, MP made it clear that from now going forward, everyone in the organisation would work harder and faster to ensure that the members of the public gain confidence in the work of the Department.

In this issue of **WorxNews** you will read about the Minister's plans for 2019/20 financial year, which include but not limited to, fighting fraud and corruption, ensuring that service providers are paid within 30-days and fast-tracking the upgrades at key public access points such as the courts.

When you go through this issue you will also read about some of the repairs and maintenance that have been done to court buildings across the country since Minister De Lille's series of meetings on the issue. The fast pace at which the work is being done demands the Department to maintain stability while moving ahead, as if it is repairing an aeroplane while it is in motion.

Other articles you will read about in this issue of *WorxNews* include the Minister's meeting with the DPWI senior managers, the 2-day strategic planning session to determine the Department's strategic intent for the next 5 years, as well as the men's health and wellness sessions held in different DPWI offices. As the Department tackles corruption head-on and cleans out any dirt, it is important that it also continues to support the National Macro Organisation of the Government (NMOG) in an effort to ensure a strong and capable state. In order to improve infrastructure in the country, the Department of Public Works and Infrastructure (DPWI) will need the help of all sectors of society, especially the private sector. This is according to Minister Patricia De Lille, MP. Delivering the DPWI's Budget Vote in parliament, Cape Town on 10 July 2019, Minister De Lille said Government had established, as a commitment, an infrastructure investment fund of R100 billion.

Minister De Lille said the budget allocation for the Main Vote for the current 2019/20 financial year was R7.8 billion. Of this allocation, R2.3 billion had been assigned to the Expanded Public Works Programme (EPWP). She said her department would, through the EPWP, improve youth participation through expanding youth programmes such as the National Youth Service, Youth Environmental Service and Youth Ambassadors.

The Minister revealed that her department estimated that over the five years of implementation, a total of R41 billion would be transferred to EPWP programmes. "I have emphasized that the involvement of intermediaries must be minimized to maximize the benefit of this money to the EPWP beneficiaries," said the Minister. She added that of the R2.3 billion assigned to the EPWP in the current financial year, approximately R700m goes to intermediaries.

Moving to issues of fraud and corruption, Minister De Lille said transparency was the most important deterrent to corruption. "As such, I have already instructed my officials to put measures in place for public scrutiny of our Supply Chain Management processes. There will be no secrecy in the award of tenders. From now on, members of the public will be able to observe the evaluation and adjudication of our bidding processes," explained the Minister. She said she had also instructed her department to conduct and complete lifestyle audits between August 2019 and June 2020, starting with the audit of her lifestyle.

She revealed that she had been recently briefed on the outcome of

the Public Service Commission (PSC) investigation initiated by her predecessor Mr Thulas Nxesi, into irregular staff appointments between April 2017 and March 2018. "Phase One of the investigation has revealed that 11 of the 37 Senior Management Service (SMS) members were irregularly appointed, and recommended that corrective action be taken in terms of the disciplinary code against members of staff who participated in the appointments. The PSC has further recommended that the appointments be set aside," said Minister De Lille.

She said Phase Two of the investigation concerns itself with the appointment of 677 staff at levels below Senior Management Service and that preliminary findings point to 94 staff having been irregularly appointed. Minister De Lille said she was awaiting the final report from the PSC.

Minister De Lille said that positive audit outcomes give public confidence to the work of the department. She said while the audit outcomes of the Main Vote and the Property Management Trading Entity (PMTE) had realized some improvements; her goal was that both the Main Vote and PMTE should achieve unqualified to clean audit outcomes in the next year. "To this end, all members of senior management will have a clean audit as a Key Performance Indicator in their performance contracts," clarified Minister De Lille.

On issues pertaining the professional technical skills, the Minister revealed that 80 students who joined the department's youth bursary scheme in 2014 had graduated and were currently enrolled in the Internship and Young Professionals Programme within the department.

"Currently, together with the Council for the Built Environment, my department is supporting 333 more learners from disadvantaged communities as they start out on their journey to professional status in the built environment disciplines. In addition, 112 Young Professionals are participating in the department's technical



candidacy programme, 124 Young Professionals attained Professional Registration and 306 Artisan trainees obtained trade test certificates," revealed Minister De Lille. With regards to Policy Development matters, Minister De Lille said it would be a busy year for her department.

She said the recent reconfiguration of government would refocus the work currently underway in relation to the Departmental Policy reforms. She revealed that they were busy with a review of the DPWI White Papers, which would form the foundation of a proposed Public Works and Infrastructure Bill. "There will also be a review of the legislation governing the Built Environment Professions, the Construction Industry Development Board Act, 2000 as well as the Draft Expropriation Bill," she said.

With regards to the payment of service providers, the Minister said she had introduced into the Key Performance Indicators (KPI's) of all senior management that all suppliers must be paid within 30 days, adding that the impact of not adhering to the 30-day period had a serious impact on the Small, Medium and Micro-Enterprises (SMME's). Moving on to empowerment matters, she said her department had a responsibility to ensure that the empowerment objectives were achieved.

She said this empowerment endeavor was assisted by the adoption of a Property Management Empowerment Policy in January 2018, as well as by National Treasury reforms. The Minister added that these reforms support preferential procurement strategies in favour of previously disadvantaged groups.

"During the 2019/20 financial year, the department will be implementing the approved Property Management Empowerment Policy and a target of awarding 35% of new leases to companies owned by previously disadvantaged groups has been set," said Minister De Lille.

The Minister said the DPWI was in an ongoing project of compiling an accurate asset register, including valuations. She revealed that she was in the process of appointing an independent company to verify the asset register for signoff.

"Closely linked to the asset register is land reform. As a department we are part of the rapid land release program that also included land restitution, land redistribution and land tenure," said the Minister. She said in this regard, 51 land parcels were released in the last financial year for land restitution. In addition, four (4) agricultural land parcels were availed to emerging farmers, mainly in the Free State Province.

Eight (8) land parcels were released to support economic development.

These include the release of two properties to the Airports Company South Africa (ACSA) for expansion of the Cape Town International Airport. Minister De Lille revealed that, together with other departments, DPWI would issue 33 title deeds to emerging farmers in Limpopo and release 100 land parcels to land claimants. "Further contributing to economic development of the country and expansion of transport and other strategic network linkages, 30 land parcels will be released for commercial use," said Minister De Lille.

She said over the past three years the department spent approximately R14 billion on its infrastructure construction pipeline, to refurbish and build facilities such as prisons, police stations, courts and office accommodation. She also revealed that the reduction of infrastructure budgets within Government has posed additional risk with regard to development, repair, upgrades and refurbishments.

Minister De Lille said she would begin the process of directly engaging key public access points, such as the courts, which will be followed by practical management discussions with the Department of Justice and Correctional Services. "The same will apply to police facilities and other sectors," added the Minister.

Minister De Lille also revealed that her department was implementing interventions aimed at achieving resource efficiency in state-owned buildings and contribute to achieving national commitments on Sustainable Development and climate change mitigation actions. "Together with the Development Bank of Southern Africa (DBSA) and the Government Technical Advisory Centre (GTAC), the DPWI would be concluding a feasibility study at the end of September 2019 for a programme to introduce the implementation of solar photovoltaic systems (PV) together with fitment of energy efficient equipment and technologies on our buildings. This will be piloted on 300 priority sites in the last quarter of this financial year and ultimately extended across government buildings," expanded Minister De Lille.

The Minister however added that all this was not a job for one department or even the whole of government. "Without significant private sector collaboration to augment the R100 billion infrastructure fund, we will not be able to stimulate economic growth and create the jobs our country so dearly needs," concluded Minister De Lille.





The days of new Ministers taking 18 months to re-write new visions and rulebooks are over. We have ample of policies and plans for a better South Africa and we are now at the threshold of the era of implementation. These are the words echoed by the Minister, Ms. Patricia De Lille and her Deputy Ms. Noxolo Kiviet for the newly reconfigured Department of Public Works and Infrastructure as they met the top 200 managers of the department for the first time at the OR Tambo building in Pretoria.

Minister De Lille's orders to the department are to rapidly develop a set of practical steps to deliver. One of the steps of interests is using public land and public buildings for public good. "We have 30 days to produce our first set of departmental targets, with budgets and timeframes for delivery. We are not talking wish-lists but real, practical affordable deliverables linked to real communities", stated the minister.

The minister also mentioned that as part of the newly added Infrastructure portfolio, the department was in the processes of finding loose pieces to the unit. "The Presidential Infrastructure Coordinating Commission (PICC) which is regulated by the act of Parliament will be moved to DPWI from Economic Development with the personnel. The Infrastructure Delivery Management System (IDMS) from Treasury will also be moved to us," explained Minister De Lille.

The Deputy Minister Ms Noxolo Kiviet raised the issue of the number of contract workers in the top management and the entire department as a matter of concern and said this should be attended to with the sense of urgency it deserves. "It concerns me that it seems most of our managers and staff in general are on contracts. In order to bring stability in the department and deliver services to our people, we need to find solutions to this problem," said Deputy Minister Kiviet.

The Minister and the Deputy Minister said they would be in continuous consultations with branches and the eleven Regional Offices of the Department as they hit the ground running for improved quality service delivery with urgency.







DPWI EMBARKS ON INTEGRATED PLANNING IN LINE WITH THE 6TH ADMINISTRATION

To set the tone for the Department of Public Works and Infrastructure's (DPWI) strategic direction for the next five years, the Department held the first 2-day Strategic planning workshop in July 2019.

The purpose of the strategic planning workshop was to determine the Strategic Intent for the next five years, including a revisit of the current Vision, Mission and Values of the DPWI.

The Department of Public Works and Infrastructure is also expected to be at the forefront in driving infrastructure delivery as a catalyst for economic growth and job creation as part of the 6th administration's planning priorities extracted from the 2019/20 State Of the Nation Address.

During the workshop, the Deputy Director-General: Governance, Risk and Compliance Mr Imtiaz Fazel flagged on the challenges that would be faced as a result of the extended mandate (the migration of the Infrastructure Delivery Management System (IDMS) from Treasury to DPWI and the Coordination of the public sector Infrastructure development processes).

"Assumption of the coordination role of the Presidential Infrastructure Coordinating Commission (PICC) and the National Infrastructure Plan accordingly will provide us with new implications and we need to plan accordingly," said Mr Fazel.

The delegates used what they called a 'Theory of change as a results-based planning methodology' to inform their planning process. Three Commissions consisting of senior managers from the Department and entities tackled the following challenges in their deliberations: *High Performing Organisation, *Integrated Planning, and *Infrastructure Services. The recommendations of this strategic plan would be submitted to the Minmec for final approval.

Director-General Adv. Sam Vukela in his address made mention of advancing the Batho Pele principles in the delivery of services to the public. "There is a demand for services to be informed by the needs of the people derived from extensive consultative processes," said the DG.

MINISTER DE LILLE MAKES A CLARION CALL TO TRANSFORM THE PROPERTY SECTOR

Minister Patricia De Lille, MP, has pledged to work hand-in-glove with all stakeholders in the property and construction industry. She committed the Department of Public Works and Infrastructure to the process of ensuring change and transformation in the property sector while addressing the Property Sector Charter Council (PSCC) Seminar on 11 July 2019.

The Minister also urged everyone including the private sector to also take responsibility for South Africa, saying the days of blaming government for everything were over. "We need unity with the private sector, the public sector, our communities and everyone to drive and make our country a success," stressed Minister De Lille.

She mentioned that the addition of the Infrastructure portfolio to the Department of Public Works meant that the Presidential Infrastructure Coordinating Commission (PICC) which was previously performed by the former Department of Economic Development would come to Public Works, from National Treasury, the Infrastructure Delivery Management System (IDMS) should come over to Public Works too.

The Minister added that her Department was therefore, in the process of putting together this infrastructure coordination

function to fit well into Public Works. The Minister went on to say that during this process, she would be asking for inputs from the sector and the PSCC. She said her Department will align its work to the 7 key priorities that President Cyril Ramaphosa has set as the focus of the 6th administration.

"We need to implement because we have plans in place set aside by the state President. We must get our own economy working. Government must invest more in infrastructure to enable conditions to be more conducive to create jobs in our country. We are concerned by the economy which is not growing. How do we create jobs as the sector? We are the custodians of the property sector so we need to transform," expanded Minister De Lille.

She further stressed her commitment to fight corruption and ensure transparency saying that, "Supply Chain Management (SCM) and procurement should make all tenders open for public scrutiny because we are dealing with public assets. We are going to deal with fraud and corruption in SCM, leasing, renewal of leases and delays caused. We have received complaints about our messy Asset Register therefore we are compelled to clean our Asset Register. We need to be more transparent because the public must know what we are looking after."

DPWI WORKING FASTER TO REPAIR COURT BUILDINGS

The Department of Public Works and Infrastructure (DPWI) Minister Patricia De Lille, MP, says her department had started in earnest with the repairs and maintenance to courts across the country. This, she says is because most of the complaints regarding the state of government buildings are about the courts. She was providing feedback to the media at the departmental headquarters in Pretoria on 8 August 2019, on the urgent repairs and maintenance to court buildings in the country.

The response follows her meeting on the issue with the Chief Justice Mogoeng Mogoeng, all regional court managers and the DPWI regional managers on 30 July 2019. "I have met with all regional DPWI and court managers again today to prioritise and agree on an implementation plan for repairs and maintenance, but also to look at the causes of why our buildings are in such state," the Minister said.

She said she had received feedback on some of the repairs and maintenance that had been done since the initial meeting in July. "I have received feedback and introduced consequence and contract management processes."

Durban - Minister De Lille revealed some of the problems that had been resolved in the recent past which include the repairs at the Durban Magistrate's court which is a busy court with 11 lifts. "At any given time, one or two lifts are not working. We have a term contract in place to service the lifts and today I received feedback that all lifts are working," the Minister remarked. She said the rat infestation problems and plumbing issues at the Pinetown Magistrate's Court had also been resolved.

Cape Town - The Minister went on to say that term contracts for all air conditioning systems for the courts in Cape Town were in

place. To that effect, regional managers would be visiting the courts to constantly check on these repairs. She said that at the Cape Town High Court, the Department was also replacing two lifts that would be completed soon.

"The Labour Court requires additional accommodation, we have started engaging them to procure additional accommodation from existing DPWI resources."

Johannesburg - The Minister said that for the repairs to various lifts at court houses in the Johannesburg province, the tender had been awarded and contractors were scheduled to be on site during the week of 16 August 2019. At the Brakpan court where the court was burnt, the repairs were done within two months, she said.

Minister De Lille said besides these updates, there were still problems everywhere and her department was tackling all of them thoroughly from prevention, planning and procurement processes, right through to proper implementation of the repairs and maintenance.

During the briefing, Minister De Lille mentioned that DPWI had only used just around 10% of the money budgeted for repairs and refurbishments during the current 2019/20 financial year. "The DPWI has budgeted R2.5 billion for repairs and refurbishment during this current 2019/20 financial year. Thus far, the Department has only spent R24 million in the first quarter of this year, just around 10% when the figure should be at more than 25%," she said. She added that her department should work harder and faster because the lives of South African citizens were at stake

DPWI SHINES A SPOTLIGHT ON THE HEALTH AND WELLNESS ISSUES AFFECTING MALE EMPLOYEES

The Department of Public Works and Infrastructure through the Employee Health and Wellness Unit under the Directorate Organisational Development used June, which is National Men's Health month to shine a spotlight on health issues affecting male officials.

The Unit held a Men's Forum for male colleagues based at Head Office and at the Pretoria Regional Office, at Thaba Tshwane in Pretoria, as well as a similar engagement in Durban for the male officials based at the Durban Regional Office.

The forums were used to heighten the awareness regarding preventable health conditions affecting males and also encouraging early detection and treatment of these conditions. Organisational Development Director, Mr Rueben Mahlatjie motivated male colleagues who attended the forum in Pretoria, to look after their health in order to be able to function at their utmost best.

In his address to the male officials, Mr Mahlatjie revealed the theme for this year's National Men's Health month which is "KEEPING BOYS AND MEN HEALTHY." "I know that we as men often do not prefer to go and see specialists when feel some discomforts but this needs to change and we should take our health seriously," pleaded Mr Mahlatjie. He said he had hope that men would change their lifestyles for the better after attending the informative forum.

Various professionals interacted with men on issues including the impact of violence (gender and domestic violence), cancer, HIV (causes, symptoms and management) and male medical circumcision, financial management and family matters.

Speaking at a forum held in Durban, the Employee Health and Wellness Practitioner Mr Jerry Masenya commended the wellness intervention by the department, saying it was important to cater for the holistic wellness of the employees that would otherwise not be realised, as it includes programmes that address the challenges and needs of the employees. "GEMS is one of the successfully implemented programmes that assist and encourage employees to periodically monitor their health which also promotes a healthy lifestyle," added Mr Masenya.

The Durban programme included physical wellness in which employees played a Soccer match to strengthen social cohesion among themselves. The Health and Wellness Unit is planning to host the event annually and also make it gainfully interesting to attract the participation of all employees.







UPDATE ON THE RECONFIGURATION OF GOVERNMENT



Work has begun to ensure a strong and capable state:

- The reconfiguration of government is to ensure that departments are fit for purpose and sensitive to the austerity measures driving the programmes of this sixth administration.
- Affected departments have been notified and meetings have been held with departments which are merging.
- The meetings engaged departments on the implications of the process and the expectations were outlined.
- Further meetings are planned with relevant departments who are transferring and receiving functions.
- To ensure that the process is as seamless as possible, a change management process approach is being followed.
- The Department of Public Service and Administration (DPSA)
 has appointed a change management specialist who is
 working with the affected departments. We are committed
 to sharing information with all staff in an open and
 transparent manner.
- Each of the departments involved have already put in place specialised workstreams which are focussing on key elements of the reorganisation process. This includes an HR and staffing team; a team dealing with legal issues; a team focussing on Information and Communications Technology to handle all issues to do with reorganising departmental ICTs; a Finance workstream, as well as a communications team aimed at ongoing communication with all employees.

New departments are being configured:

- Affected departments are being assisted with the management and development of their start-up structure and have been advised to adhere to critical timelines.
- Affected departments are working to structure the strategic intent, mandate as well as their key performance areas.
- Officials from the DPSA who are organisational development (OD) specialists have been tasked to assist departments with their start up structure.
- We remain committed in ensuring minimal disruptions within the public service.
- Public servants will regularly be briefed on the work taking place in their respective departments.
- The reconfiguration of government departments will at all times respect the Public Service Act.
- The rights of workers will be protected through a collective agreement which will be concluded with unions admitted in the Public Service Coordinating Bargaining Council (PSCBC).
- Plans are in place to cater for officials who are affected due to duplications of functions resulting from mergers.
- · They will be cared for in accordance with by the PSCBC

- collective agreement, which will be communicated to the public service once concluded.
- Discussions are underway to determine how departments deal with excess staff.
- Our journey of renewal has begun.
- Affected departments are in the process of analysing their IT systems that support related business processes.
- They are in the process of conducting an audit of the infrastructure, along with identifying existing IT projects and those under procurement.
- Work to analyse the legislation and policies, along with challenges in how merging departments will handle their existing licences is underway.
- Departments will collaborate with their legal services on how to handle existing ICT contracts and service level agreements.

The reconfigured state is starting to take shape:

- A total of 22 departments are affected by merging.
- Fifteen departments are to be abolished once the process is concluded.
- This will include the transfer of legislative functions from one minister to another.

Schedule 1 of the Public Service Act has been amended to reflect 10 new departments:

- · Agriculture, Land Reform and Rural Development
- · Communications and Digital Technologies
- · Employment and Labour
- · Environment, Forestry and Fisheries
- · Mineral Resources and Energy
- · Public Works and Infrastructure
- · Sports, Arts and Culture
- · Science and Innovation
- Trade, Industry and Competition
- · Women, Youth and Persons with Disabilities

That might be part of the reason that it is not nearly as painful as the down Comrades Marathon. I acknowledge that while I prefer the Up Run, it is however a mean physical challenge."

Team members will be training hard from their respective Regional Offices to prepare for more marathons ahead.
