## MINISTER PATRICIA DE LILLE ZOOMS INTO INTEGRATED LUFHERENG HUMAN SETTLEMENTS DEVELOPMENT IN SOWETO



Public Works and Infrastructure (DPWI) Minister Patricia De Lille in her capacity as Chairperson of the Presidential Infrastructure Coordinating Commission (PICC) Secretariat conducted an oversight visit of the integrated Lufhereng Human Settlements development in Soweto, Gauteng - to view progress on the project.

She was accompanied to the project by her Deputy Ms Noxolo Kiviet, Head of Infrastructure Investment in the Presidency Dr Kgosientsho Ramokgopa, Gauteng MEC for Human Settlements Urban Planning, Co-Operative Governance and Traditional Affairs Lebogang Maile and MEC for Infrastructure Development Tasneem Motara, the Mayoral Committee Member for Human Settlements in the City of Johannesburg, Councillor Mlungisi Mabaso and the two councillors for the area, councillors Elliot Sithole and Theo Dhlamini.

Speaking during the site visit, Minister De Lille said she was pleased with the pace of the project and glad to see some of the units being occupied by residents.

The Lufhereng project is located within the City of Johannesburg, to the west of Soweto and was classified as a mega housing project on 2000 hectares of land secured by the City of Johannesburg for the western expansion of Soweto. The project has the capacity to accommodate over 30 000 households in a wide variety of housing typologies and land tenure options.



To date, 1 319 housing units of various typologies have been completed and are occupied and around 2 093 housing units of varying typologies are currently under construction.

The City of Johannesburg and its appointed contractors are implementing the development, as the project is being implemented in 10 phases over a number of years up to 2029.

The oversight visit forms part of Minister De Lille's duties to monitor progress of the 62 projects which were gazetted as SIPs, as part of the Infrastructure Investment Plan approved by Cabinet on 27 May 2020.

One of the beneficiaries, Nokuthula Nkabinde, a mother of two children, told the *WorxNews* reporter that she was happy that she finally had a home.

"Before getting my own place, I was struggling, renting a shack which was very small and could not accommodate all of us. One of my kids was staying with relatives," she said.



Public Works and Infrastructure Minister Patricia De Lille with the Head of Infrastructure Investment in the Presidency Dr Kgosientsho Ramokgopa on 19 August 2019 conducted an oversight visit to the N3 road upgrade projects in KwaZulu-Natal, to assess progress and receive updates from the project team on these important projects.

The visit forms part of the minister's duties to monitor progress of the 62 Projects which were gazetted as Strategic Integrated Projects (SIPs). This as part of the Infrastructure Investment Plan approved by Cabinet on 27 May 2020.

Implemented by the Department of Transport and the South African National Roads Agency (SANRAL), the N3 development comprises two projects and spans over the next six to eight years and includes 14 packages estimated to be in excess of R20 billion.

The two sections of the road currently being upgraded are divided into two contracts and the work is already bringing significant benefit through Small, Medium and Micro Enterprises (SMME) empowerment and job creation. Currently, 248 people are employed on site of which 148 are from the Mkhambathini and Msunduzi local municipality areas. The number of employees is expected to increase to 450 in 2022 with a total of R103 million to be spent on local labour.

The project will see much needed road expansion and upgrades to the N3 between Cato Ridge and Dardanelles as well as between Dardanelles and Lynnfield. The upgrade will improve the current 4 lane to 8 lane dual carriageway over a distance of

6.4k. This will reduce turn-around times for freight-carrying vehicles as well as shorten the travel time between Durban and Johannesburg.

"We are incredibly proud of the good work done by SANRAL and the National Department of Transport in implementing the N3 Cato Ridge development which will bring much needed relief to the traffic congestion on this national road. The N3 carries the country's logistics economy and is an essential economic driver in the province of KwaZulu-Natal," said Dr Kgosientsho Ramokgopa.

Minister De Lille stressed how the importance of decent roads and infrastructure cannot be over emphasised. "I was pleased to listen to and see the progress on site first hand. Our roads are important carriers ensuring that people can get to work safely while also ensuring that economic goods can be transported safely and efficiently.

"This project is one of many which demonstrates the Infrastructure Investment Plan in action and brings to life the objectives of the Economic Reconstruction and Recovery Plan (ERRP) to reignite our economy and assist the struggling construction sector and provide much needed jobs for our people," the Minister explained.

She revealed that over the next few weeks, she would be visiting more of the SIPs that are in construction in various provinces, to demonstrate government's investment in infrastructure, which in turn creates the crowding-in effect by the private sector.

## DPWI'S YOUNG PROFESSIONALS WHO HAVE RECENTLY OBTAINED PROFESSIONAL REGISTRATION



Ms Athenkosi Sihlahla is a Professional Landscape Architect (PrLArch) stationed at Head Office. She is one of the DPWI's young professionals who have obtained professional status through the Young Professionals Programme.

She says in order to obtain her professional registration, she had to study for a 3-year National Diploma in Landscape Technology at the Cape Peninsula University of Technology. Thereafter she studied for an additional year towards her B-Tech in Landscape Technology at the

Tshwane University of Technology. Once completed, she then registered with the South African Council for the Landscape Architectural Profession (SACLAP) as a Candidate Landscape Technologist.

"In 2016 I was in a one-year internship programme with DPWI, where I worked as a Candidate Landscape Technologist. A year later, I went back to the university to study towards my Master's degree with the University of Cape Town. While doing my final year of my Master's degree, I was fortunate enough to get a job at one of the Landscape Architectural firms, where I worked for a year and 6 months.

"After registering with SACLAP, I obtained the required points in the five core competency categories to be eligible to apply for the registration of professional landscape architect. Upon completion of the required hours/points, I submitted the necessary reports for assessment of my professional competence. I applied through the special dispensation registration, which only required academic qualifications and a minimum of 2 years-experience (demonstrated through a Portfolio and Logbook)," explains Ms Sihlahla.

She says being professionally registered with SACLAP means that she has reached the acceptable competency level of professionalism and that she now qualifies for better positions in the field. She now has obtained the necessary skills and knowledge to lead projects independently and sign off drawings without a mentor. "With my professional registration, I am eligible to open my own landscape architectural firm," she further expressed.



Mr Lunga Sithole is a Professional Landscape Architect (PrLArch) stationed at Head Office. He is one of the DPWI's young professionals who have obtained professional status through the Young Professionals Programme.

His journey to obtaining professional registration came after he had completed six years of tertiary education and three years of practical experience. His journey started when he enrolled with the Cape Peninsula University of Technology where he completed a National Diploma in Landscape Technology, and followed with a B-Tech degree in the same field. "Thereafter I attended a month long 'Introduction to Spatial Design

Studio' course at the University of Cape Town, which lead to my acceptance to their two year long Master of Landscape Architecture program that I completed within the years 2017 to 2018," he said.

In 2019, Mr Sithole registered with the South African Council for the Landscape Architectural Profession (SACLAP), where he underwent two years of training alongside a professionally registered Landscape Architect, who was a mentor and supervisor to him. Upon completion of the required work exposure within the two years, he applied for the Landscape Architect Special Dispensation Registration. This process required that he provide a portfolio which could afford evidence that he had covered all core competencies required from a Professional Landscape Architect.

"Being professionally registered to me means I am a competent individual in my profession and I'll be held liable and accountable for all work provided under my capacity as a Professional Landscape Architect. I will still be required to acquire continuous development within the profession and I'll be required to uphold council standards with all work produced. Registration to council also offers peace of mind to clients as they would expect council standards in all work completed by a professional member," he says.

"With my professional registration I can apply for a position at a higher level that offers job security as companies tend to require registration when hiring. Affiliation with the council also offers some form of advertisement to clients as one is listed on the council's web page as a registered member. Currently, there are a number of countries across Africa that recognise our professional registration," he concludes.



The Department of Public Works and Infrastructure's Gender unit partnered with the Department of Agriculture, Land Reform and Rural Development (DALRRD) to host emerging women contractors and emerging women farmers for technical skills in KwaZulu-Natal (KZN) and the Eastern Cape, respectively. The training was conducted by the National Home Builders Registration Council (NHBRC) at the Ray Nkonyeni Council Chambers in Port Shepstone on the KZN South Coast and at the Carnegie Hall in Gonube East London from 31 August to 3 September 2021.

The training was aimed at providing the women with foundation information and basic technical skills to enable them to navigate their way in their chosen industries. The training provided the women with information on the DPWI economic empowerment programmes, as well as the Supply Chain Management processes. Other objectives of the training included creating a viable environment for the participation of designated groups in the EPWP Enterprise Development, Vuk'uphile and emerging contractor Learnership Programme, as well as capacitating the designated groups on business processes.

During the sessions, the emerging women contractors were able to raise some of the frustrations they encountered in their field of work. The training formed part of the Women's Month commemorations.

"As women in this industry, we need to stop emerging at some point, and finally claim our position and take on equal opportunities in what is usually labelled as a male-dominated industry," said Gender unit's Chief Director, Rev Naledi Stemela while opening the training for the emerging women contractors in Port Shepstone.

Ms Thobeka Klaas from the KwaZulu-Natal Provincial Department of Public Works highlighted that there was a need to bring women to the centre of the economy and society through socio-economic activities. She said in order to develop women, the Department had aligned its initiatives with the Millennium Development Goals, five National priorities and the 12 outcomes of Government Programme of Action to ensure gender mainstreaming actually happens. Over and above the presentation, the Provincial Public Works secured the venue for the training and played a crucial role in the coordination of the event.

One of the women who attended the training, Ms Phumeza Kate from Ilinge Lethu Bafazi said the training was a positive step taken by the Department. "We are full of excitement and pride, we regard this as one of the corrective measures by the Government to bridge the inequality gaps and we hope we can be part of a project that can be piloted in the near future. If this can happen, we can be assured that we have started somewhere," said Ms Kate.

After completing the training, all the women were awarded with certificates from the National Home Builders Registration Council. The NHBRC provided the training free of charge. Going forward, a database of the trainees will be developed and a collaborative empowerment project established, as a pilot.














While some cannot begin to figure out how they can successfully juggle work, taking care of a home and school work; Ms Tlou Modiba who is a Receptionist in the office of the Deputy Minister in the Department of Public Works and Infrastructure, is celebrating her decision to pursue a postgraduate degree, while maintaining an 8-to-5 job.

Ms Modiba says while she has walked a difficult road academically, she has learnt that if you really want to achieve your goals - patience is key and that giving up is not an option. She has added that it is important to also speak to people who help motivate you whenever the journey gets tough. She says she celebrates every win along her way, but is mindful of the fact that education is a continuous mission. A *WorxNews* reporter spoke to Ms Tlou who takes us through her journey.

I am Tlou Jane Modiba, formerly known as Tlou Jane Kgomo around the Head Office of the Department of Public Works & Infrastructure. Most of my colleagues call me Sesi Tlou. I'm from Juno Village in Ga-Matlala in the Limpopo province. I joined the Public Service in April 2008 and moved to the Department of Public Works in 2012 working with the then Deputy Minister Jeremy Cronin.

In 2015, the Department announced the bursaries for the 2016 academic year and advised employees to apply. I took a risk and applied to the University of Pretoria for a Master in Policy Studies as my

first choice and a Master in Town and Regional Planning as my second choice. I was surprised when I found out that I was admitted to the faculty of Engineering for a Master in Town and Regional Planning — my second choice. After my registration, I unfortunately learnt that the Department took a decision not to fund the post-graduate degrees, so since I still wanted to study towards the Town and Regional Planning degree, I paid the course fees out of my salary with the back-up of Fundistudy loan.

Juggling studies and work was really difficult, but with the assistance of my colleagues in the then Minister Thulas Nxesi's office, together with the DG's team, I managed to push forward. Colleagues like Maphefo Mbatha, Nosizwe Waqu and Emma Modiba, Maxwell Sikhwari, Mamikie Phiri, Bathabile Malope and Uncle Jones were some of my pillars. There were times where I would go to the Deputy Minister's office to greet him and he would ask me how the class was and requested to see the things that were challenging me in class to assist.

I'm grateful to former Deputy Minister Mr Jeremy Cronin for his total understanding. He didn't block my way regardless of the busy schedule of his office. I would squeeze studying later during work days and I was also studying during the weekends. On Fridays, I would arrive home from work, do the washing and prepare food for the family. On Saturday mornings, I'd wake up to hang the washing to dry and prepare myself to come to the Department to study in the peaceful environment.

Along the way in mid-2017, I felt the work and family pressure were enough to put a strain on me. I remember one day during break at University, I was sitting quietly alone outside having a lone chat in my mind and I was greeted by an unknown lady who told me she knows me and she frequently met me at the passages of the Department of Public Works. On that day, I was about to take a major decision of cancelling the studies as I was feeling the pressure. I introduced myself and told this lady that I wanted to quit my studies because I felt that as I was coming from an administration environment in the Ministry, this could disadvantage me in class.

The lady introduced herself as Thendo Matoti, working for the Town Planning services of the National Department of Public Works and she discouraged me from quitting. She gave me all of her latest study material the following day and encouraged me to continue with my studies. She even invited me to her place to assist me when we were about to write exams and provided me with more study material for revision. I'm grateful to Thendo Matoti for a major role she played in my studies.

On the 3rd of September in 2019, I went for the graduation ceremony of my Master of Town and Regional Planning. I felt so humbled when I saw Deputy Minister Noxolo Kiviet, MP in the graduation hall and when they announced her name in the dignitaries list. Since her appointment in Department in 2019, the Deputy Minister has helped review my career goals upon discovering my academic ambitions. She recommended the strategies for achieving my goals and I noticed her role as that of a true leader, not of a boss.

She arranged for me to do my practicals in the Town and Regional Planning section of the Department of Public Works and Infrastructure. She's really a great person to work with. She advised me career-wise on several occasions and her advice was very helpful as it paved a direction for me. I've really enjoyed the opportunity to get to know and work close to her. I've nothing much to offer her but a thank you note. My road to obtaining my postgraduate degree was not an easy one. Only patience was the master towards success.

## THE EPWP MAKES A POSITIVE IMPACT ON THE LIFE OF A GOUDA RESIDENT



A former Expanded Public Works Programme beneficiary says she always acknowledges the fact that the much needed skills she gained through the EPWP were a stepping stone to a permanent job that she has.

Ms Hildegard Adonis from Gouda a village that is 37km south of Porterville in the Cape Winelands District Municipality in the Western Cape province, says after completing Grade 12, she worked in factories and on farms. Determined not to remain jobless after the liquidation of a steering wheel factory she worked for, she began selling second-hand clothes, however she was soon without an income and ended up staying at her husband's home.

She says she, her husband and her son eventually moved into a rented home in Gouda and she relied on her husband's income. Here, she explains her journey: "Unemployed and directionless, I went to the Gouda Library and asked for volunteer work; the staff did not hesitate and received me with open arms. Andrid Pieters and Camille Lewis trained me in the basics and Gouda Library became like a second home for me. After volunteering for a year, I was offered an EPWP contract by the Drakenstein Library Services - under the mentorship of the Wellington Library.

They worked shifts, I could not say no because I knew my heart was in the right place and I had found my passion. At 4 o'clock in the morning I would stand up no matter the rain, darkness or wind to catch the 5:30 train, arriving at Wellington station at 6 o'clock and then the half hour walk to the library.

When the shift is over I would walk and by the time I get at the station the train would be gone, and for a week I hiked. The latest I ever got home, was 10 o'clock and not once did I complain. Through my determination and the hunger for my passion, I never gave up.

After my mentorship, Library Services offered me a job at Hermon Library. For 2 years, I was on an EPWP contract. My money was just for travelling expenses, not once did my husband say I must quit the job because he saw the passion in my eyes whenever I spoke about the community and the children.


Every time a new post opened, I applied and got as far as two interviews but was unsuccessful both times. Because of that, it drove me to do better at my job.

I felt my job description was so unimaginative and I expanded my services to creative classes, training for the youth and everything I saw that the community might need. I was willing to help with everything, and some would say; "I will never break my back for EPWP-money" and I would always say; "where there is a will, there is a way."

I received a Certificate of Excellence and that was a great achievement for me, because someone saw the work I was doing for the community. I received on the job training and in return used my skills to contribute towards the up-lifting of the community and to deliver excellent library services.

The 9th of September 2017 will be memorable for me, because on that day I signed a contract for a permanent job with Drakenstein Municipality. Being on the EPWP gave me hope and my dream of getting a permanent job to provide for my family came true. Thanks to Mrs. Lorensia Thomas and Drakenstein Municipality who believed in me.

The EPWP programme is a meaningful contributor to current household incomes of unemployed people, and especially the youth, women and people with disabilities. My motto is "If you have a passion for your work, you never have to work a day in your life". When things are not going as you want, you just have to keep trying and trying. Never let obstacles ruin your goals, let them serve as a motivator to you until you reach your goal."

## 1. CAN PEOPLE WITH CHRONIC DISEASES, SUCH AS HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE, GET THE VACCINE?

People with chronic diseases such as high blood pressure, heart disease and diabetes are at higher risk of getting severe COVID-19. Therefore, they will benefit the most from getting the vaccine. They should also make sure that their condition is controlled, go for regular check-ups with their healthcare practitioner and take their chronic medication. If you are unsure about your condition, consult with your healthcare practitioner.

## 2. FOR PEOPLE WITH ALLERGIES, WHO SHOULD NOT GET THE VACCINE?

- 1) Anyone with a history of severe allergic reaction to any ingredient in the vaccine.
- 2) Anyone who is allergic to polyethylene glycol (PEG) should not get the Pfizer vaccine, as it is one of the components.
- 3) Anyone who had a severe allergic reaction after the first dose should not get the second dose of that vaccine.

If you previously had an allergic reaction to a medication or vaccine, but are unsure what specific ingredient caused it, please speak to your healthcare practitioner before getting the vaccine.
