NEW SHIPMASTERS WELCOMED ABOARD THE DPWI SHIP

During their first meeting with top management of the Public Works and Infrastructure family, Minister Sihle Zikalala and Deputy Minister Bernice Swarts, made it clear that it was time for the Department of Public Works and Infrastructure to 'put into action' the plans that would ensure the best service to clients.

The meeting held on 10 March 2023 followed President Cyril Ramaphosa's cabinet reshuffle on Monday, 6 March 2023 where the new Minister and Deputy Minister were revealed. The officials who welcomed Minister Zikalala and Deputy Minister Swarts include the then DPWI's Acting Director-General (ADG), DPWI Deputy Directors-General (DDGs) as well as the representatives of Boards and top executives from DPWI's entities.

Zikalala is a familiar face in South Africa's political circle. He has been a member of the KwaZulu-Natal (KZN) Legislature since 2015. Remaining loyal to his home province, he served as the KZN MEC of Economic Development, Tourism and Environmental Affairs from 2016 to 2019. He then took it a step further and became KZN's Premier where he served from 2019 to 2022.

On the 5th of August 2022, he resigned as the Premier of the province and was succeeded by Nomusa Dube-Ncube, who later appointed him as her MEC for Co-operative Governance and Traditional Affairs (COGTA). He resigned from this post on 31 January 2023 as the ANC in KZN announced that he would be deployed to the National Assembly amid talks of Cyril Ramaphosa's cabinet reshuffle which has now seen him become the Minister of Public Works and Infrastructure.

Bernice Swarts was officially sworn into office as a member of the National Assembly on 22 May 2019 after the ANC won 26 out of 47 regional Gauteng seats in the National Assembly. On 27 June of the same year, she was appointed to serve on the Portfolio Committee on International Relations and Co-operation and the Standing Committee on Public Accounts (SCOPA). On 15 July 2020, Ms Swarts left SCOPA and only served on the Portfolio Committee on International Relations and Co-operation until 6 March 2023 when she was promoted to Deputy Minister of Public Works and Infrastructure.

As part of their welcome to the Department, the ministry was met with presentations from each of DPWI's branches and its entities. These presentations were to get them up to speed with the comings and goings of the 'massive ship' that is the DPWI.

The ministry was appreciative of these presentations and they made it known to the ADG and DDGs that the theme of the year is to live up to the Department's slogan: South Africa Works Because Of Public Works. "We need to hit the ground running and be an example to other government departments because they are our clients", said Deputy Minister Bernice Swarts.

She went on to say that if the DPWI fails to provide its clients (fellow government departments) with quality service, then South Africa as a whole will crumble. With those words, she asked that the Department's EXCO roll up their sleeves and get to work, more especially because the President said that this is the year of action.

DPWI HOSTS FINAL PWSCBF FOR 2022/23 FINANCIAL YEAR

The Department of Public Works and Infrastructure (DPWI) hosted the last quarterly Public Works Sector Capacity Building Forum (PWSCBF) at the Anew Hotel in Centurion, Pretoria on the 1st and 2nd of March 2023. The forum constitutes of members from the Professional Services Branch in the DPWI, the four Public Works Entities (CBE, ASA, CIDB and IDT) Skills Development Senior Managers and Senior Managers of Human Resources Development/Capacity Building from the nine Provincial Public Works.

The purpose of the forum is to foster co-operation within the Public Works Sector to strengthen the efforts of building technical capacity for the state and impact on job creation.

In keeping to one of the goals of the forum, members presented on various topics such as the National Framework for Built Environment Technical Capacity Building of the State (referred to as the "National Framework") and the Implementation of the Standard for Developing Skills through Infrastructure Contracts.

The National Framework has been commissioned by the DPWI to facilitate, co-ordinate and monitor technical capacity building

activities within the built environment. It seeks to provide strategic direction and ensure a comprehensive and coherent approach to technical skills and capacity building in support of the public sector mandate. Members of the forum welcomed the presentation and extensively deliberated on it.

One of the most impressive presentations was made by Dr Herman Tshesane who is the founding member and Director of the Karabo Centre for Mathematics, Science and Commerce. This centre was officially registered and launched in 2013 with a vision to alleviate poverty by improving the number of learners with bachelor passes in Mathematics and Sciences, thus, increasing their chances of admission to tertiary education.

By 2017, 419 learners had benefitted from the project, with 285 having secured full bursaries. 64% of the 285 learners were female. As one would imagine, members of the forum were highly impressed with this centre as it had a great success rate. DPWI head office officials mentioned its similarity to the department's Winter School Programme and commended Dr Tshesane for the splendid work he has been doing.

MINISTER OF THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS AND INFRASTRUCTURE - MR SIHLE ZIKALALA, MP



Mr Sihle Zikalala is an ANC activist, husband and a father. He is driven by the ideals of a united, non-racial, non-sexist, equal and prosperous society. Born in Ndwedwe in 1973 to a religious family, he grew up to become a humble yet formidable and courageous social activist.

The circumstances of colonial and apartheid misrule of the time determined him to fight to throw off the yoke of poverty and social injustice that Blacks were subjected to. These early experiences with inequality and prejudice inevitably propelled Zikalala to join the liberation movement at the tender age of fifteen years.

It was the beginning of a journey that would see him entrusted with key responsibilities within the Liberation Movement in South Africa, including being appointed Secretary General of the ANC Youth League, ANC KZN Deputy Provincial Secretary and Provincial Secretary.

He was previously Chairperson of the ANC, the Premier of KwaZulu-Natal, and MEC for Cooperative Governance and Traditional Affairs (COGTA). In December 2022, he was elected into the National Executive Committee (NEC) of the African National Congress. On 6 March 2023, Mr Zikalala was appointed Minister of the Department of Public Works and Infrastructure (DPWI).

Prior to his deployment as Premier of KwaZulu-Natal, Mr Zikalala was the MEC for Economic Development, Tourism, and Environmental Affairs (EDTEA) and Leader of Government Business – positions which he held with great diligence and

passion. It was under Mr Zikalala and the legislature collective that the province of KwaZulu-Natal pioneered ground-breaking transformation programmes under Operation Vula, which included Radical Agrarian Socio-Economic Transformation (RASET) as well as a Bulk Buying and the Warehousing programme.

He has carved out a solid reputation for himself as an ardent proponent of the Black Industrialist Programme, a national government initiative which seeks to hasten the pace of the empowerment of black owned enterprises. Minister Zikalala contributed immensely to the attainment of peace in KwaZulu-Natal in the early 1990s. He remains seized with the task of deepening peace, advancing democracy and achieving social and economic prosperity for the people of South Africa.

At the heart of his efforts lies a passion to see the South African economy transformed, growing, and being competitive to reduce inequality, poverty, and unemployment.

Mr Zikalala is a champion for gender equality, youth empowerment, and an advocate for quality education. He strongly believes in education and regards it as an indispensable weapon in the arsenal to advance equality and improve people's quality of life.

Mr Zikalala holds a degree in Communication Science from the University of South Africa, an Honours degree in Public Administration from the University of KwaZulu-Natal (UKZN) and a Master's degree in Leadership Studies from UKZN.



THE 'BEITBRIDGE BORDER FENCE' RADAR

The Beitbridge border post in Musina, Limpopo forms part of the political border between South Africa and Zimbabwe. After OR Tambo International Airport, the Beitbridge border post is the second busiest port of entry in South Africa. A 40-kilometre fence was erected at Beitbridge in 2020 as one of the emergency measures that government was implementing to curb the spread of coronavirus in South Africa. However soon after its construction, it started to fall apart and just a portion of the 1.8m-high fence is still standing today.

The newly appointed Minister of the Department of Public Works and Infrastructure, Sihle Zikalala, conducted an inspection of the fence on the 4th of April 2023 to ensure if it was serving its purpose.

Minister Zikalala acknowledged, during the inspection, that the border post project, which was done in the year 2020, was a complete failure. He said that the fence is unfit for function and that money was wasted during its construction.

"We are here at this border post because it is one of those government projects that has not gone well. We will not allow wrongdoing, and we will address all mistakes and guarantee

that where there are failures, we improve. When wrongdoing occurs, people must be held accountable," he said.

Minister Zikalala has promised to deal with the pressing issue and ensuring that consequence management is implemented. "Consequence management is the only way to build a culture of responsibility and integrity," he said.

During a media briefing at the Beitbridge border post, the Minister mentioned that indeed the inspection was long overdue, however, within his first month serving the Department of Public Works and Infrastructure, he was able to go on the ground for an inspection. He told the media that he has committed himself to returning to this boarder post within the next coming two months.

"We are engaging in a process to improve our services to the departments we serve and to the people at large. This is not the only port-of-entry we are going to deal with. We will ensure that all ports-of-entries in South Africa will be provided with services that are of good standards from our Department." he said.

DPWI CREATING AWARENESS OF THE PLUMBING INDUSTRY

The Department of Public Works and Infrastructure, together with the Institute of Plumbing South Africa (IOPSA), and South African Women in Plumbing (SAWIP), hosted their first Plumbers conference in Durban, KwaZulu-Natal on the 19th and 20th of April 2023. The two day conference was aimed at raising awareness and sharing knowledge about the plumbing industry.

At the conference were exhibitions focused on manufacturers, suppliers, plumbing services, and opportunities for skills development. The conference served as an entry point for planned training programs to upskill government plumbers. The department targeted 1000 plumbers through this intervention. The plumbers will be trained during the 2023/24 financial year and through a financing combination of local as well as international sponsors (state and commercial).

Lorraine Mooi, Co-founder and President of SAWIP emphasized on the importance of plumbers in South Africa. "Plumbing is critical and it's important the public understands that plumbing isn't just sticking two pipes together. We need to understand the importance of what we do as Plumbers and that without plumbers, schools, doctors and lawyers cannot do what they do" she said. Relating to the sacristy of water in South Africa, Lorraine also stressed how imperative it is to utilize professionals.

Brendon Reynolds, the Executive Director of IOPSA, spoke out on how risky it is to allow unskilled or unregistered plumbers to handle plumbing in homes or other facilities that people use on a daily basis. "We are working closely with DPWI and other government departments to promote and explain why it is critical to use qualified plumbers. We're also looking for ways to regulate the industry so that only qualified people who know what they're doing, work on our water and sanitation systems," Brendon said.


He also underlined that if we continue to entrust inexperienced and unqualified individuals to work on our water systems, we will continue to contaminate our own water.

Thandeka Msibi, Director of the Human Capital Investment Unit at DPWI, said that the aim of the conference was to provide state plumbers with the tools they needed to excel in their respective fields. Thandeka stated that the purpose of the conference is to equip artisans with the most recent trends in the plumbing industry and to ensure that they are aware of the technologies available to empower themselves.

She believes that all artisans who attended the two-day conference will be inspired to register for the various professional bodies in order to grow and educate themselves further, in order to be more competent and professional in serving the department's clients.

DPWI CELEBRATES INTERNATIONAL MOTHER LANGUAGE DAY

The Department of Public Works and Infrastructure (DPWI) participated in the celebration of International Mother Language Day (IMLD) on 21 February 2023 at Malamulele Community Hall in Limpopo Province. Mother Language Day is celebrated globally every year on 21 February.

The Day was celebrated under the theme “Multilingual Education – A necessity to transform education in a multilingual world”. Education in many countries around the world occurs in a multilingual context however a number of countries adopt monolingual system of education and on the contrary perceives multilingualism or the use of several languages as a challenge. The provision of education in only one language that is not shared by many learners has a negative impact on learner performance as well as on their literacy skills.

The participants to the International Mother Language Day were delegates from the National Department of Sports, Arts and Culture (DSAC), various government departments, officials from provincial departments and local municipalities, academics from tertiary institutions, National Library of South Africa, traditional leaders, learners and educators from Malamulele area.

As a gesture in encouraging the use and development of mother language in public service, Dr Cynthia Khumalo: Deputy Director General at DSAC informed the participants that DSAC has embarked on a bursary project by which it sponsors matric learners to pursue careers in language practice and studies in

various universities and universities of technology. These matriculants are funded to study careers such as Translation, Interpreting, Editing, Sign Language, Language Planning, Human Language Technologies, Terminology Development, Lexicography and Language Subtitling.

National Library of South Africa also encouraged participants to develop a culture of reading and availed books translated in various official languages free of charge. The South African National Lexicography Unit that specializes with the development of dictionaries also exhibited some of their dictionaries and literary work produced in many languages.

The provincial house of traditional leaders, who are the custodian of land, language and culture also encouraged communities that they lead to be proud of their mother language and use it in their daily lives. In his guest speech, Dr Madala Hlungwani from the University of Venda hinted that, “We as a country are lacking strategies to promote the use of mother language for academic purpose and this is further aggravated by lack of political will, human and financial resources”.

In his conclusion, he emphasized that the state should create conducive environment for the development and use of mother language in areas such as mathematics, science, technology and engineering in order to accelerate service delivery using many languages.

ENSURING THE SAFETY OF STATE OWNED PROPERTIES

The various tools and mechanisms that we use every day and have now been accustomed to, were once ideas. The cellphone you cannot stay away from, the television you watch your series on, the social media app you use to stay in touch with your loved ones – all of these were once ideas, and it is from these ideas that our lives have been advanced for the better.

The OHS Management System, is a software developed by DPWI's very own, Mr. Maputle Maphutha, who is currently working for the department as an Assistant Director: Occupational Health and Safety (OHS), based at the Pretoria Regional Office. Occupational Health and Safety (OHS), according to Innovative Occupational Hygiene Solutions, a company responsible for occupational hygiene inspection at workplaces, refers to the protection and safeguarding of employees from any potential risks, hazards, incidents or fatalities that may occur as a result of dangerous, negligent or hazardous events or environments in the workplace.

This profession is derived from the Occupational Health and Safety Act 85 of 1993 and its main objective is to protect the health and safety of employees at the workplace. As such, each and every place of work should either have OHS personnel or conduct an occupational health and safety audit annually to ensure compliance with the act. Since the DPWI is a massive department with a large portfolio, it employs OHS personnel with three situated at each of its eleven regional offices.

Maputle is one staff member who has gone further than just having an idea but has created a software that is an absolute game-changer for the Occupational Health and Safety profession. Like a devoted employee, he seeks to make a positive impact in the department through the implementation of a software he started creating back in 2014. This software is called OHS Management System. As an individual who is passionate about OHS and has experience in developing software, he availed himself to his managers to assist after he heard about the opportunity to develop a software for the OHS unit.

Having created the software, Maputle presented the demo version to managers in 2014, which they loved. The main objective of the OHS Management system is to “align OHS duties at the DPWI with the OHS act”, says Mr. Maphutha.

With this software, OHS practitioners are able to back up all the reports from inspections that they have conducted at various sites managed by the department, be it at construction sites or office spaces, and make recommendations about the safety of workplaces based on these reports. The software is also linked to work emails so that colleagues are able to easily share reports or information related to OHS with each other. Furthermore, this software is designed to be accessible to every staff member that works closely with OHS practitioners. This means that if a Director or Deputy Director of OHS Compliance needs to review a report made on the inspection of a police station in Ga-Rankuwa, for example, they are able to access it on this software themselves, using their own login details.

To ensure that the information on the software is readily and easily available to those who need it timeously, Maputle went on to create a mobile application (app) version of the software. The mobile app would enable OHS practitioners to conduct their inspections using their smartphones or tablets instead of a checklist on an A4 paper at hand. A more detailed inspections would result with the use of this mobile app as each inspection report is accompanied by pictures and remarks, by the inspector, of the various parts of buildings or workplaces that have been inspected. This would promote transparency and efficiency between relevant colleagues and within the DPWI at large.

After visiting Mr. Maphutha and learning how his software and mobile app works, which took less than an hour because it is so simple to use, I realized that there is no reason for this software to not be adopted. It's user-friendly, it's suitable for both Android and IOS devices, it's accessible anywhere, anytime and it is free! So many injuries and potential fatalities in the workplace could be avoided across all government departments around the country with the use of the OHS Management System. With that being said, I hope that Mr. Maphutha's vision to have all OHS units in government departments work hand-in-hand with each other is realised. Only in working together will we achieve more as the South African government.

Imagine a TB-free world

What is Tuberculosis (TB)?

Tuberculosis is an infection caused by germs that spread through the air from person to person. Although TB often affects the lungs, it can also harm the brain, kidneys, or spine. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), if a person with tuberculosis does not receive treatment they will die.

Is TB contagious and what are the symptoms?

Yes, it is contagious. When a person who is diagnosed with TB coughs, sneezes or talks, they may infect those around them. These germs can stay in the air for several hours, depending on the environment. You are most likely to notice the symptoms when you experience a bad cough that doesn't go away, or even chest pains. It is easy to mistaken TB for a cold or flu, however, it is always advisable that you consult a doctor when you experience this.

According to the National Health Service (NHS), symptoms of TB differ depending on which part of the body has been affected. TB usually takes a while to show up and it may take weeks before you feel sick. It's possible for your symptoms not to appear for months or even years after you first contracted the infection. It is also possible for the symptoms to go completely unnoticed.

Other symptoms you may encounter include:

- Coughing up blood or phlegm
- Chest pains
- Trouble breathing
- Loss of weight and appetite
- Night sweats
- Fever
- Generalized body aches
- Fatigue

Types of TB

According to WebMD Health network, TB comes in two different forms:

1. Active TB: As the bacteria spreads, you become very sick. This type of TB can easily spread to other people through coughing, sneezing and talking. According to WebMD Health Network, 90% of Active cases in adults come from a Latent TB infection.

2. Latent TB: This type of TB is not contagious and does not show any symptoms. Although when the bacteria is already inside of you, your immune system prevents the bacteria from spreading. However, the virus is still present and might become active at some point. Your doctor will prescribe medication to stop Active

TB if you have HIV, you have had an infection within the last two years, have an unusual chest X-ray, you are at high risk for reactivation.

Available treatments of TB:

Active TB: It can take six to nine months to treat Active TB. It's essential that those who have TB disease finish the entire course of treatment exactly as instructed by the doctor. If this doesn't happen, the illness can come back and become more difficult to cure.

Latent TB: Years could pass by while a person has latent TB without experiencing any symptoms or getting sick. However, if the bacteria is found, the CDC advises a three- to four-month treatment plan.

Every year, **World Tuberculosis (TB) Day** is commemorated on the 24th of March to raise awareness on the disease and its effects on the human body. TB is set to be one of the world's deadliest disease to date. According to World Health Organization (WHO), over 4100 people die from TB every day, and approximately 28,000 more contract this preventable and treatable illness. However, since the year 2000, 66 million lives have been reportedly saved due of global efforts to eliminate Tuberculosis.

"World TB Day 2023, with the theme 'Yes! We can end TB!', aims to inspire hope and encourage high-level leadership, increased investments, faster uptake of new WHO recommendations, adoption of innovations, accelerated action, and multi-sectoral collaboration to combat the TB epidemic." - WHO.

To work towards a TB-free world, there are precautionary measures you can take;

- TB may linger in the air for several hours therefore it is important to have proper ventilation.
- Sunlight can fight the TB bacteria, which is destroyed by UV light.
- Practicing good hygiene.
- When coughing or sneezing, you need to cover your mouth and nose to stop the transmission of TB bacteria.
- Having a healthy immune system is the best form of defense against TB.

According to TB Alerts, 60% of adults with a healthy immune system can completely kill TB bacteria within their systems.
