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DPWI STRENGTHENS GREEN BUILDING POLICY

The Department of Public Works and Infrastructure (DPWI), through the Green Building Unit, hosted a Green Building workshop in Gqeberha, in the Eastern Cape on 29 and 30 June 2023. The purpose of the workshop was to strengthen the implementation of the Public Works Green Building Policy while exploring ways for the Department to best respond to the problems that the country faces, such as high level of unemployment, load shedding and increasing utility costs.

Green Building stakeholders from various provinces attended the workshop under the theme “Upscaling and Institutionalising Green Building towards socio-economic development”.

The official estimates by the United Nations Environment Programme Sustainable Building Initiative (UNEP-SBI) is that globally, buildings are responsible for 30% and 40% of energy and water consumption respectively. The DPWI represents the largest property portfolio in the country and is responsible for the consumption of a significant amount of electricity and water. The Department, therefore, has a responsibility to not only deliver and manage quality infrastructure but to save water and reduce energy consumption.

Addressing delegates at the Green Building workshop, DPWI Gqeberha Regional Office Regional Manager (RM), Johan Van Der Walt, stated that the Green Building Policy is underpinned by a number of national and international declarations and prescripts. “We need your expertise, energy and your commitment to drive the green building initiative,” he told the delegates. He noted the declarations from the Nairobi conference held in 2010 on green building rating systems as just some of the pronouncements that justify the Green Building Policy. At that conference, at least 19 African countries adopted a declaration to promote and foster green building practices in Africa.

Participants underlined the urgency to improve the environmental performance and energy efficiency of buildings in order to 'reduce carbon dioxide emissions and help strengthen the ability of cities to

adapt to climate change while improving the quality of the built environment.

RM Van Der Walt further emphasized that it was important to make a meaningful contribution to:

- sustainable development
- resource efficiency
- mobilisation of technology
- creation of green jobs.

Leading the Green building initiative in the Eastern Cape, Luvuyo Nkwentsha from the province's Department of Public Works and Infrastructure, said all stakeholders had a big responsibility to assist communities in becoming more environmentally friendly to live in. “By looking at the migration into a greener economy, we have a huge responsibility on our shoulders to make sure that we are creating jobs and sustainability,” said Nkwentsha.

Mfundo Xulu Ka Dlamini from the DPWI Green Building Programme emphasised the need for DPWI management, regions and provinces to institutionalise Green Building as a norm and practice throughout the Department by ensuring that it is a shared responsibility with other branches and units contributing to sustainability imperatives in all their projects.

In terms of policy, Green Building encompasses:

- Integrated Renewable Energy and Resource Efficiency Programme (iREREP)
 - Energy Performance Certification (EPC)
 - Eco-Labeling
 - Energy Efficiency, including Energy efficiency project (LED Lighting)
 - Water Efficiency
 - Waste Management Biodiversity and Indigenous Knowledge System (IKS) Construction and demolition waste management.
- The abovementioned Departmental Green Building projects are at different stages of implementation and planning.

SOUTH AFRICA LEADS THE GREEN HYDROGEN PRODUCTION CHARGE

Public Works and Infrastructure Minister Sihle Zikalala attended and delivered a speech at the African Forum of the World Hydrogen 2023 Summit and Exhibition held in Rotterdam, Netherlands on the 9th of May 2023. He was a part of the African Forum alongside government representatives of Morocco, Mauritania and Namibia. Hydrogen is a clean energy source that the world is gradually shifting towards using as it is less harmful to the Earth's ozone layer and South Africa is one of the frontrunners in the production of hydrogen from the conversion of ammonia.

In preparation for the World Hydrogen Summit in the Netherlands, Minister Zikalala went on an oversight visit to the Sasol Gas Engine Power Plant in Sasolburg, Free State on the 4th of May 2023, as it is currently producing hydrogen in South Africa. Another gas engine power plant is being constructed by Infrastructure South Africa (ISA), in Boegoebaai in Port Nolloth, Northern Cape.

Interestingly, as Namibia is in major support of the migration to a green hydrogen energy source, the country has set aside a stretch of 500 km of land along its coast which they have declared as a hydrogen corridor for the construction of a massive gas engine power plant which will produce green hydrogen. This plant will merge with the Boegoebaai Green Hydrogen Development Programme in Boegoebaai, Port Nolloth as it is a mere 20km from the Namibian border.

This will ultimately join together with South Africa's hydrogen corridor along the coast of South Africa following the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding between Northern Cape and Western Cape as reported by Theresa Smith of ESI Africa. The Ubuntu Green Hydrogen Energy Project, Boegoebaai Green Hydrogen Development Programme (both in the Northern Cape), Atlantia Green Hydrogen in the Western Cape and Hive Ammonia in the Eastern Cape will make up the green hydrogen corridor along South Africa's coast.

In addition to the aforementioned developments, Minister Sihle Zikalala expanded on the potential green hydrogen



international and domestic demands. On an international scale, he expressed that South Africa aims to export 4-8 megatons (MT) of green hydrogen by 2050. He said there is a strong potential to capture 4%-8% of the ammonia export market to countries such as Japan and South Korea.

In addition to that, South Africa could also venture into exporting value added products such as green steel and fertilizers. Not only will this bring in a much-needed economic boost to South Africa, but it will do so without adding to the toxic carbon emissions of the globe that has seen many South Africans become victims of floods and droughts due to climate change brought on by carbon emissions.

Domestically, the country's demand for green hydrogen could reach 2-3 MT by 2050. Through this production, Minister Zikalala hopes to attract investors to build 3-5 gigawatts (GW) of electrolyser capacity and 6-10 GW of dedicated renewable energy by 2030.

The Minister's visit to the Netherlands proved to be successful and fruitful as it further cemented South Africa's place as one of the world's leaders of green hydrogen production. It also gives South Africans hope that our country's economic woes will lessen through South Africa's green hydrogen production.



GOVERNMENT DEPARTMENTS JOIN FORCES FOR THE REFURBISHMENTS OF ROBBERN ISLAND

The Department of Public Works and Infrastructure (DPWI) together with the Department of Arts, Sports and Culture has implemented the upgrade and refurbishments at Robben Island. DPWI Minister Sihle Zikalala visited the Island to assess and monitor the progress that has been made on the Island thus far. The aim of this project was to conserve and maintain the Island's World Heritage status for generations to come.

Addressing the media, Minister Zikalala thanked the DPWI, the Department of Arts, Sports and Culture and the Robben Island Museum for the work that has been done for the preservation of this heritage site. "As you may have seen, there are a number of projects that are in progress, particularly operations and maintenance," he said.

Robben Island has a solar plant that generates electricity which is also supported by diesel from time to time. Minister Zikalala mentioned that the desalination plant is being upgraded to ensure the provision of water as well as a number of boreholes that will be installed. He revealed that R2.1 Million has already been spent on the desalination plant.

The Museum Council Chairperson, Saths Cooper, stated that there are areas of the island that people have not seen and which the oceans have already engulfed. "This indicates that our beautiful eco-system has to be preserved. In order to

prevent Robben Island from losing any more of its current land mass, we have a number of universities from South Africa and abroad that will join us in looking at a much more methodical approach to the island's shrinking," he said

Minister Zikalala concluded his remarks at Robben Island by saying that the Department of Arts, Sports, and Culture will carry out the following projects on the island:

- restoration of the Blue Stone Quarry Wall
- upgrading of the Harbour precinct
- upgrading of the desalination plant
- upgrading of the effluent plant
- building a new float jetty
- reticulation of the diesel plant
- upgrading of bulk services and new plants.

"The Department has implemented recommendations on reports to prevent further damages being caused to the state's infrastructure during riots and protests," he said.

The department is the custodian of the harbour and bears the burden of its buildings and infrastructure between Hout Bay communities and other spheres of government. Concerns about the harbour's day-to-day operations were raised by community members, who also suggested potential solutions such as to alleviate poverty in the area. ■

GREEN HYDROGEN CONFERENCE IN ANGOLA HEARS OF JOB CREATION POTENTIAL AND ECONOMY REJUVENATION FOR SOUTH AFRICA

Public Works and Infrastructure Deputy Minister Bernice Swarts joined over 200 delegates from different countries in Africa, Europe and Asia, in Angola's capital Luanda for the 1st Southern African - European Green Hydrogen Conference. The three day conference, came as regional and international expectations of harnessing Southern Africa's huge renewable energy potential are very high.

In November 2022, President Cyril Ramaphosa hosted the inaugural South African Green Hydrogen Summit where the country was showcased as a green hydrogen investment destination of choice. One of the key announcements made at the summit was the gazetting of 18 Green Hydrogen projects as Strategic Integrated Projects, placing those projects as a national priority.

In her address at the conference, Deputy Minister Swarts highlighted some of South Africa's advantages of becoming a world class Green Hydrogen production hub, including a superior renewable energy endowment with a combination of wind and solar irradiation, vast pieces of land not suitable for

agriculture and human settlements on which to produce this renewable energy, the availability of water through the desalination of sea water and the largest industrial base on the African continent which allows for both domestic consumption and the ability to produce value added products such as green steel and green fertilisers.

The Deputy Minister said South Africa had a pipeline of Green Hydrogen Strategic Integrated Projects, with a capital cost in excess of US\$20 billion (over R360 billion) stemming across multiple elements such as green ammonia, e-methanol, sustainable aviation fuel, green steel, fuel cell manufacturing, mobility and infrastructure.

During a panel discussion, Masopha Moshoeshe from Infrastructure South Africa (ISA) highlighted the need to tap into renewable energy amid the power crisis currently faced by South Africa. Moshoeshe said by 2050, in the South African context, Green Hydrogen had the potential to increase SA's Gross Domestic Product (GDP) by 15 to 30 billion US Dollars (over R540 billion) per annum, create 700,000 to 1.4 million permanent jobs and attract investment of 100 to 250 billion US Dollars.

A DRIVE TO REVIVE SA'S SMALL HARBOURS

The Department of Public Works and Infrastructure (DPWI) embarked on the refurbishments of South African harbours in hopes of improving the country's oceans economy. The refurbishments are done through the Economic Reconstruction and Recovery programme that seeks to repair and refurbish the country's harbours to increase their operating efficiency.

On the 4th of May 2023, Minister Sihle Zikalala, conducted a site visit at the Saldanha Bay Harbour in the Western Cape, to assess the progress made thus far in reviving the harbour.

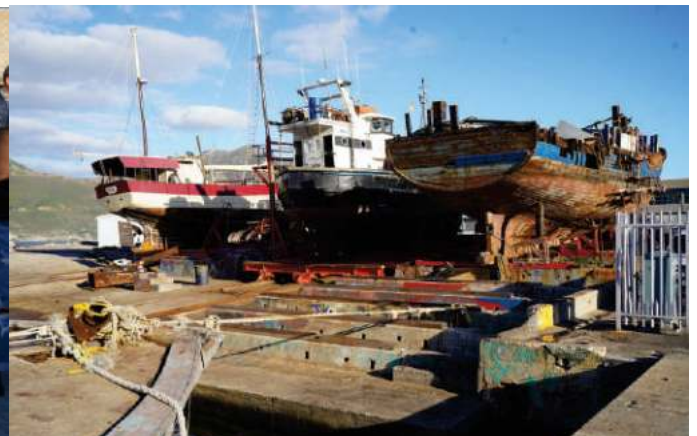
The Saldanha Bay harbour is one of the thirteen proclaimed fishing harbours in South Africa, a home to one of the largest exporting ports of iron on the African continent and the largest natural port in Africa. The Saldanha Bay local Municipality relies heavily on its thriving commercial fishing industry, which involves the fishing of oysters, mussels, fish, crayfish and more. DPWI has invested R501 million for the refurbishment of 13 small harbours across the country to unleash the oceans economy, help uplift communities who rely on fishing for their livelihoods and create a conducive environment that will enable residents around the harbour to benefit from job creation, cleaner oceans etc.

Addressing attendees at the Saldana Bay harbour, Minister

Zikalala stated that he would like to see community members benefiting from the Economic Reconstruction and Recovery programme, and he will ensure that it is well implemented in the Eastern Cape, Western Cape, Northern Cape and KwaZulu-Natal. He was pleased to see the private companies in the harbour working together with community members in order to lessen the unemployment levels in the Saldanha Bay local Municipality.

“The local people have an infrastructure now whereby they can register, lease and operate their small businesses. We are working to ensure that the rates for the leases are not so high, in order for us to accommodate small businesses too. This also means that big companies need to allow opportunities for small businesses to join the value chain and that's why we will continue to develop small harbours, to assist local communities,” said Minister Zikalala.

The Saldana Bay harbour and Hout Bay are among the 13 proclaimed fishing harbours in South Africa that are being repaired and refurbished to increase operating efficiency. These projects also seek to create jobs and empower Small Medium and Micro Enterprise (SMME) in the surrounding communities.



DPWI MINISTRY INSPECTS DISA COURT BUILDING

The Minister of Public Works and Infrastructure, Sihle Zikalala, together with the Deputy Minister (DM) Bernice Swarts visited Disa Court building in the suburb of Bishop Lavis in Cape Town on 22 May 2023, as a build up to the Budget Vote Speech to be held the following day. Disa Court building is currently undergoing repairs and renovations to provide a conducive working environment to its client department, the South African Police Service (SAPS).

The aim of the ministerial visit was to assess the progress made regarding these renovations and establish the targeted period of completion as the building currently accommodates 230 SAPS Crime Intelligence Unit employees.

The project has created 86 National Youth Service (NYS) work opportunities for the unemployed youth who are taking part in the renovations and repairs of the Disa Court building. Moreover, the participants were trained in various skills such as carpentry, painting and plastering. These critical skills will increase their employability when they exit the programme.

The project's exit strategy is important for the Department of Public Works and Infrastructure's (DPWI) Ministry which is why

Minister Zikalala encouraged the participants of NYS to learn as much as they can so they may be able to create their own small businesses since employment in the country is hard to come by at the moment. "As the DM said, don't take this as the end but as a step that calls for many steps going forward," said Minister Zikalala as he congratulated the beneficiaries on the work they've done at the building.

Leelan Williams, one of the beneficiaries of the Disa Court building project, took to the podium to share some words on what being a part of the project meant to him. "Our area is riddled with gangsterism. I came here with two other friends but they have since dropped out of the programme and gone back to gangsterism," said Williams.

He further expressed his gratitude for the opportunity the DPWI has afforded him and his fellow youth in the community to gain some valuable skills and giving them a chance at changing their lives. Leelan Williams' words left all attendees feeling pleased and encouraged to continue fulfilling the mandate of the Department going into the new financial year, which is to create work opportunities through the EPWP.



MINISTER DELIVERS HIS FIRST BUDGET VOTE SPEECH

Minister Sihle Zikalala presented his first Budget Vote speech at Parliament on the 23rd of May 2023 following the inception of the new financial year. National Treasury allocated a budget of R8.7 billion to the department, and of the R8.7 billion allocated to the DPWI, just over 50% of the budget, which amounts to R4.5 billion, is allocated to the Property Management Trading Entity (PMTE) whilst R2.7 billion is allocated to the Expanded Public Works Programme (EPWP).

Budget allocations within the DPWI are all in an effort to oversee the implementation of infrastructure projects and the creation of jobs so as to stimulate the growth of the economy. These efforts are in line with the Infrastructure Investment Plan which was approved by Cabinet in May 2020. As such, 88 Strategic Integrated Projects (SIPs) have been gazetted and they cover fundamental infrastructure networks in energy, water and sanitation, transport and digital communications, human settlements, agriculture and agro-processing.

Since being in the department, the ministry has been proud of the works and job creations that the EPWP has brought to the department. One great project of the EPWP is the renovations that are current underway at the Disa Court Building in Bishop Lavis, Cape Town.

The Disa Court building is currently undergoing renovations which have seen the creation of 86 National Youth Service (NYS)

work opportunities for the youth who reside in the area. Due to such positive efforts, the department aims to intensify this intervention and make it more impactful as it looks to spread out its allocated EPWP budget in the following manner:

- R1.2 billion to the Infrastructure Sector through the Integrated Grant Incentives for Provinces and Municipalities.
- R1 billion for the Non-State Sector Programme implemented through one of DPWI's entities, the Independent Development Trust (IDT).
- R426 million for the Social Sector EPWP Integrated Grant for Provinces.

With regards to the allocated budget for PMTE, the funds are projected to be spread out in the following way:

- R71 million is allocated for precinct development.
- R350 million is allocated for the repairs and maintenance of the 53 land ports of entry around South Africa.
- R90 million for dolomite risk management where government buildings are at risk of collapsing due to sinkholes and dolomitic issues.

“We are repositioning the Department of Public Works and Infrastructure as a key role player in the economic recovery and reconstruction programme of the country. We are renewing the way of doing things within the department and introducing a performance driven attitude and approach,” Minister Zikalala proclaimed during his delivery of the budget vote.

THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THE REAPATALA (WE PAY) TRACKING SYSTEM

The Reapatala tracking system is a web based system, developed in-house by the Chief Directorate: Information and Communications Technology (ICT) within the Department of Public Works and Infrastructure (DPWI). The system was developed by ICT in conjunction with the Finance Unit and is accessed from Head Office and 11 regional offices, dealing with invoices in the department. The aim of the tracking system is to improve the turnaround time for processing of invoices in line with applicable prescripts. The system was developed in December 2015 for DPWI employees to track and manage invoice payments within 30 days.

What does it do?

- Reapatala creates transparency between the service provider and the department. Automatic emailing of unpaid detailed reporting from the Director General, Regional Managers and Finance Managers on a daily basis.
- Automatic emails are sent when the invoices are paid to inform the service provider that the Department has paid the invoice and the money should appear within 30 days.
- It enables the ability to interface with payment systems (Sage, PMIS and WCS) to terminate invoice aging on a daily basis.
- It enables monthly easy access to reports submitted to National Treasury in a single system and no longer from disparate regional spreadsheets, requiring constant consolidations at Head Office.
- It enables automatic emailing to service providers, once an invoice is received and captured on Reapatala to communicate and confirm that the department has received the invoice which will be paid in 30 days.

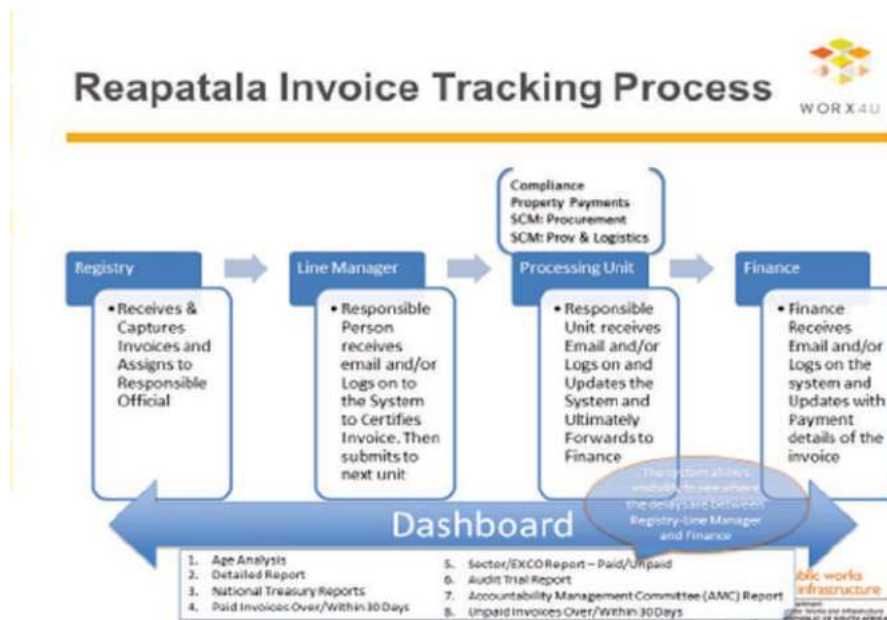
- It enables reports to be accessed timeously as the information is now centralised and available at a click of a button and no longer have to wait for the regions to submit the spreadsheets. It has improved speed in the processing of invoice payments by line managers and daily updating of the paid invoices by ICT.

How has it helped DPWI?

- Previously, the process was decentralised where each of the 11 regional offices maintained their own spreadsheet which was submitted once a month to Head Office for consolidation.
- The automated process introduced a centralised system through the implementation of Reapatala. All the information is now captured on a single system.
- It has enabled reports to be accessed timeously as the information is now centralised and available at a click of a button and no longer have to wait for the regions to submit the spreadsheets.
- Improved speed in the processing of invoice payments by line managers and daily updating of the paid invoices by ICT.
- Readily Available Integrated Reports with up to date information.

The system is currently used by all 11 DPWI regional offices including Head Office to capture, manage and track invoices received in the department from suppliers for services/products rendered.

The picture below shows the Reapatala invoice tracking system process:



Advantages of Reapatala tracking system:

- Access Controlled
- Profile Driven with Jurisdiction Separation (PTA, PLK, ETC)
- Fully auditable
- Early warning emails indicating invoices that are about to reach 30 days to enable and remind line managers to prioritise and pay outstanding invoices.
- Detailed and summary reports automatically sent to affected officials in the value chain including Chief Financial Officer (CFO).
- Readily available and standardised National Reports can be timeously accessed and submitted on time.
- Supports the CFO with tracking and monitoring the 30 day payments

of invoices from all regional offices with ease.

The Department's Thomas Seletela from Financial Accounting and Reporting says since the Reapatala tracking system has been established, the number of unpaid invoices have drastically been reduced from over a thousand to less than 5 per week. "The Department has become much more transparent as communication of each milestone of invoice processing is communicated to internal DPWI line managers, Supply Chain Management and Finance," he says.
