These laws were used to oversee migrant labourers during the apartheid era, maintain population segregation, and control urbanization.

National Women's Day and Women's Month exists to honour the women who bravely fought for our freedom as well as to recognize the advancements made in the modern day by women of all backgrounds, ethnicities, and religions in spite of obstacles encountered.

Celebrating women in DPWI

"I believe that the emancipation of a woman is an inside job. You need to practice the act of liberating yourself. " — Nyeleti Makhubele.

The commemoration of Women's month was celebrated by the women staff within the Department of the Department of Public Works and Infrastructure (DPWI), on the 18th of August 2023 at Batter Boys Village – Pretoria North.

The event was centered on accelerating socio-economic opportunities for women's empowerment. It was fitting for the Department's Acting Director-General (ADG), Nyeleti Makhubele, to be present and open proceedings at the event since she is a woman herself.

"Many women struggle with the concept of beauty, because we believe that beauty comes from outside and with the compliments from others. In fact, beauty should be something you feel inside of you; that's when it radiates, " said Ms Makhubele. She continued to speak about the four agreements while uplifting other ladies.

She mentioned that each lady should make and abide by these pledges to herself, which are as follows:

- 1. You must be impeccable with your word. Mean what you say and say what you mean but also be mindful of what you say to people because words can be hurtful.
- 2. Don't take anything personally. What I say has absolutely nothing to do with you but everything to do with what's in my heart and my state of mind.
- 3. Don't make assumptions. It is better to ask a question and look foolish for a short moment than to keep quiet and remain foolish for the rest of your life.
- 4. Always do your best. "If you can't fly, run. If you can't run, walk. If you can't walk, crawl but whatever you do, keep moving."

Ms Makhubele additionally encouraged women to keep one another responsible to the pledges they made to themselves, as doing so will foster a sense of togetherness among them. This unity is required among women in order to eliminate the daily hardships they experience in society. This solidarity was demonstrated by the women who marched to the Union Buildings in 1956, and it is the same unity that the DPWI ladies have been asked to demonstrate in implementing the "Future is Female" concept.

Thandeka Zulu, one of the attendees, said it meant a lot to her to be recognized by the DPWI in this way."We need to learn from our sisters and mothers who have gone before us on this journey." This Women's Day gathering gave us the opportunity to learn from them because they know more than we do," Thandeka added.

I don't know what can be done so that women can be recognised and be given the same opportunity men receive in everything they do)."

Sometimes as a cleaner, I feel undermined. Sometimes NPA members ask me about the whereabouts of dockets that I know nothing about. Once I get asked that question, I feel undermined. Secondly, there are toilets we all use. Sometimes users don't clean-up after themselves.

I was once called by the Department of Justice officials to come and open/lift the toilet seat for her because she was afraid the previous user didn't flush. I felt undermined. Sometimes when we deliver toilet paper to offices, sometimes officials are not in their offices and we pass. When they come back, they scream our names asking for toilet paper in passages, where there are members of the public. You will feel embarrassed and your confidence reduced and feel like a real cleaner)."
